Smith the aviator in charge of the £10,000, for the first long distance air flight, Great Britain to Australia

Lyons, Nov. 12, 1919.-Arrive Lyons three-forty. Misty far as Favourable wind throughout, but much time wasted avoiding storms imy behaved splendidly..

Pisa, Nov. 14, 1919.-Left Lyons at ten-six: fine weather; sunshine all way; few heavy clouds but other wise a perfect flying day. Flew along Riviera: crossed Gulf of Genoa Remo, and Spezia. Landed at Pisa at two-forty. Too late to get to Rome. Going Taranto to-morrow. Alps looked very fine in sunlight. Vimy O. K.

ROSS SMITH.

TELEGRAN. "Landed Pisa Nov. 13th. Could not make Rome. Proceeding Taranto tomorrow. Everything O. K." CAPTAIN HORN.

Milan, Nov. 15 .- Ross Smith landed at Pisa last light, owing to darkness, and proceeding to Taranto to-day. Vimy going well. MEADOWS.

Rome, Nov. 16 .- Landed here 3 p.m., owing to strong wind. Everything O. K. Proceeding to Taranto to-mor-

ROSS SMITH

Rome, Nov. 16.-Yesterday at Pisa. leavy rain. Aerodrome under water Attempted start but got bogged; spent day on machine: had engines running eight to-day. Bogged baly taxi-ing; used planks. Italian mechanics dug out machine; bogged again, but finally got away. Sensational start. Bennett held tail down until machine moving, then made running jump at rear cockpit; hauled aboard by Shiers as machine was leaving ground. Aerodrome two inches under water, but Vimy ose beautifully. Crew very wet but cheerful. Encountered strong head wind. Ground speed only fifty miles an hour. Passed through some heavy clouds, otherwise hazy and bumpy but landed at Rome at three o'clock.

ROSS SMITH

Canea, Nov. 17, 1919, 4.15 p.m.-Left Rome yesterday morning at 9 o'clock. Landed Taranto 11.45. Again low clouds; visibility bad. Passed over Capua and Naples and then turned east over mountains; flew low over photograph. Very bumpy over mountains, machine falling several hundred feet at times; good wind helping us. Greatest assistance afforded us at Toranto by aerial route.? Spent afterlong set stretch. Left Taranto 8 today, arrived Suda 3.45. Strong wind on our beam, low clouds, rain all way to South Greece. Attempted to get above clouds but too high, so flew at 800 feet. Following coast nearly hit a small island in mist. From South Greece to Crete good weather; slight head wind. Aerial route station here giving all assistance. Hope reach Cairo to-morrow. Crew fit, hoping better weather. Now much warmer. Repeated Sydney.

Cairo, Egypt, November 18.-Left Suda Bay eight to-day, arrived Cairo 3.30 Weather again bad. Low clouds. Crossing Crete mountains difficult. Wind slightly favorable; steered south rse after leaving, but had to fly steamers half way, checked ground speed and drifted on them. Crossing two and half hours. Struck Wadrinatrun. Hope reach Damascus or Bagdad to-morrow. All very pleased to have got here. Hope for better reather now. So far have taken thirty flying hours mostly through est assistance rendered by aerial route stations. Nothing being too much trouble. Largely due their excellent organization we are here so soon. Vimy going perfectly.
