## The Teachers' Convention.

### OPENING SESSION.

The Teachers' Convention—the first of its kind since pre-war days—opened yesterday afternoon in the Methodist College Hall. His Excellency the Governor was present, also Hon. A. Barnes, Minister of Education, Mr. I. C. Morris and several of the N.T.A. Executive, and one hundred and fifty teachers of both sexes.

R. Dwyer, Esq., President of the N. T. Association, after the National Anthem, heralding the arrival of the Governor, introduced His Excellency, who in his address, first welcomed the teachers to the city, gave a brief point in his life's history in England illustrating his capacity to lecture to the teachers assembled, after which he spoke briefly on some of the causes underlying the choice of the teaching profession as a life's work. He emphasized the importance of training the teachers, and showed his practical grasp of his subject by stressing the fact that the child must be interested before it can be taught. His Excellency also dwelt on the salaries of teachers, and thought the teachers now in convention, should endeavour to obtain a more equitable stipend.

The next speaker, Hon. Dr. Barnes, spoke almost entirely on the new Education Bill. He referred to several of its sections. Touching first on the normal school he, as always, forcibly showed that the need of training the teachers, the directors of spiritual and moral growth, is fully as great and greater than the necessity of training lawyers, etc., men who look ostensibly after the material issues. He then showed why he thought an advisory board necessary. For his part he was determined to keep the office out of party politics, and felt that with an advisory board there would be a power to whom all differences between teachers, superintendents and even the minister might be carried for adjustment. In dealing with the appointment of inspectors, or rather supervisors, the minister showed from his own experience of recent years, the necessity of giving much more inspection than at present. Three superintendents and their assistants are unable to fully supervise, and therefore in the Bill recently passed, provision has been made for the appointment of eleven supervisors, who will receive a year's training abroad and then give help and guidance to the teachers in the districts allotted them. The minister also referred to the grant apportioned for the assistance of those old teachers, who do not benefit by the present pension scheme. The sections dealing with school libraries and night schools were also explained, and any teacher who has had an outpost experience can vouch for the absolute necessity of both these educational adjuncts if Newfoundlanders are to uplift themselves above their present status. The subject of salaries, the minister regretted to say, was not satisfactory to him, in so far as he would like to see a bigger increase, but he was pleased to say that the biggest augmentation grant ever given, had been passed at the recent session of the Legislature. This augmentation means 40% increase on the present. It is small, but we have hopes of better in the near future. The minister concluded by saying that in reference to His Excellency's speech he had urged the Government

to appoint a commission to probe the salaries of teachers, so data would be forthcoming on which to adjust the same.

Mr. I. C. Morris spoke for half an hour or so on Patriotism and Citizenship. His speech was delivered in the speaker's usual forcible vein, and proved very interesting.

Mr. W. M. Butt, Secy. of the N.T.A., moved a vote of thanks to His Excellency, which was seconded by S. P. Whiteway, 1st V.P. His Excellency, in humorous vein, replied. After the close of the evening's session, and in response to the Governor's invitation, the majority of the teachers visited Government House where an informal reception was held.—S.J.H.

## Young at Seventy-Eight.

The electrical instrument which made the late Sir James Grant, consulting physician to the General Hospital, Ottawa, look fifty at the age of eighty-six, was shown to an interviewer recently by the inventor, Mr. T. C. Hodgkinson, of Hammersmith.

Mr. Hodgkinson is seventy-three, but might pass for anything between forty-eight and fifty-two. His face is ruddy, his eyes are bright, and his tread is firm. He has not a trace of baldness and moves with the ease of a man of twenty-five. He did three years' munition work, putting in ten to twelve hours a day.

The electro-neurotone, as the machine is called, is three to four inches in length and two and a half inches wide and high. It has a controlling switch to regulate the current and is worked by a dry battery. Applied to the skin, it produces a pleasant tickling sensation.

"How does this keep one young?" Mr. Hodgkinson was asked.

"Sir James Grant," he replied, "explained it in the 'Montreal Medical Journal' as making possible the building of more tissue, the absorption of more oxygen, and great improvement in nutrition. A person not only feels younger but looks younger, for defective blood-making power shows itself particularly in the face."

"Dr. Grant cites the case of a woman, aged seventy-eight, who, after neurotone treatment, moved about with the activity of twenty years before and said she felt almost youthful."

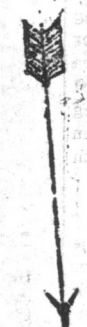
