OF ELEMENTARY SCHOOLS.

ditor Evening Telegram Dear Sir.—In a letter to the "Daily News" a short time ago, "Parent" reerred to an important decision taken in England on the subject of denom-inational schools, of which he had read in the Educational Supplement of the London Times. He has kindly lent me, through the Editor of the News, the supplement referred to, and I find that the article in it contains information which everyone, and specially every member of the Church England, in this Colony ought to have, and which therefore I propose to pass on. The article is rather too long to ask you, Sir, to print, so I shall endeavor to condense it. There are in England, it says, about

21.000 elementary schools: 'A great

many of these are public undenominational schools supported and run by the covernment: but about 10.000 are England, with the assistance of government grants; in other words, they are something like our Newfoundland schools. People in England are now beginning to feel, as many of us do here, that this is a wasteful and inefficient system in these hard times. and second, that public schools ought not to be classified on religious lines. The Rt. Hon. H. A. L. Fisher, late Minister of Education in England, put forward some proposals a year or two ago; and, as a result, apparently, of this, the National Assembly of the Church of England appointed, in July 1921, an education committee to consider the position. This Education ommittee presented their report in Pebruary 1922. The substance of their report, according to the Times' article, is as follows:

1. They consider the provide that in every school religious instruction according to the views of the various denominations he given regularly in school hours by the teach ers of those denominations trained and qualified to give it; all denominations to be on equal footing: and the eachers to receive training in giving religious instruction. No. one to be compelled to receive religious instruction against his conscience; and provision to be made for pupils to receive religious instruction outside the school if necessary. Local and central religious committees to be appointed to see that these arrangements are properly carried out.

2. Subject to these conditions, the Committee consider that a national united system of elementary schools might with advantage take the place of the present system. (That is to

say, the Church schools.) 3. Any school to stand out of this scheme if it likes, but if it does it will no longer receive any support from the Government. And now, mark this. The Times says:

"The National Assembly received the report, and passed without opposition a resolution that the National Assembly of the Church of England would support a settlement of the problem of religious education upon the terms outlined," and towards the end of its article it says. in the words already quoted by "Parent" in the Daily News:-

"The Church of England has thus officially proclaimed its readiness to accept a settlement on the lines of Mr. Fisher's proposals. Those proposals are essentially proposals for a real educational peace. They presuppose that the scheme outlined would be an agreed scheme on the basis of true religious equality, and that all concerned, Boards of Education, authorities, teachers, voluntary school supporters, and others interested in educational administration would work together without ulterior motive, and with no desire to override the one the other. If these aims to be secured, then the State and all the religious bodies, without petty jeal-ousies, without mutual fears and suspicions, may work heartily side by side in the great cause of National
