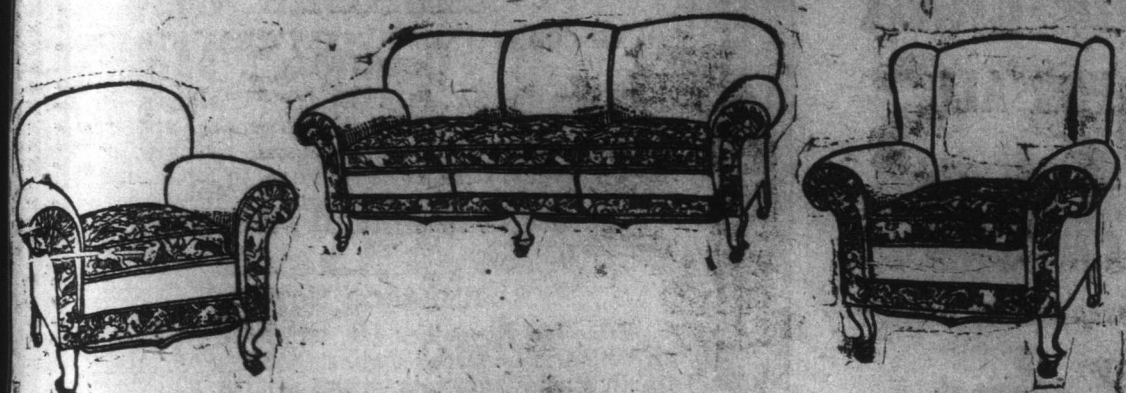

**Empire Address at Curling**

There can be few people now who have not heard of the great British Empire Exhibition at Wembley, but, unfortunately, there are many who have not had an opportunity of visiting it. We therefore owe a great debt to Miss Hubbel, who has so kindly come amongst us in Corner Brook to describe, as far as may be in a short time, this great achievement.

Friday and Sunday were the evenings chosen by Miss Hubbel to put before us her story of Wembley and all that it stands for. On both occasions, an appreciative audience filled the Regent Theatre to hear Miss Hubbel who may rest assured that she has helped very materially to bring before us all that Wembley should mean to us, as citizens of that great fellowship of diverse races and countries, which we are all proud to call our British Empire.

As Miss Hubbel made quite clear, there are two aspects to the Wembley Exhibition. First, the show itself, with its buildings, parks, pavilions, etc.; second, all the far less material things of which these form the symbolic representation; and it was only fitting that, to a large extent, it was the latter aspect which chiefly occupied the interest of the lecturer and her audience.

The whole story was splendidly illustrated by a series of excellent lantern slides, these being aptly arranged so as to show side by side the numerous activities and places of the Empire, first as they actually are, and secondly in their representation at Wembley.

As a specific example of this, we may mention that famous project, the Canadian Pacific Railway, with all its many ramifications, familiar probably to most of us. This organization acted as a tremendous pioneering influence in the building up of one of our great Dominions, and it has a worthy exhibit at Wembley, including a full-size model of the newest 6000 class of locomotives. All this was very well described by Miss Hubbel.

In addition, Miss Hubbel had amassed a large fund of most interesting information regarding the Empire—its economic statistics, historical details, and general geographical facts. All this was most ably put before us, in the short time available, and, woven as it was into a great Empire story, and illustrated by the slides, helped all to appreciate not only the immense undertaking of the Exhibition itself, but—what is far more important—to realize the great privileges and responsibilities which fall to us as citizens of the greatest Fellowship of Nations.

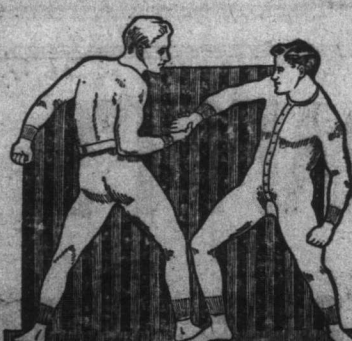
