Several of these disturbances can e obviated by care. The greatest nemy of all, known as atmospheric r static, is the one thing which man annot yet overcome.

We often hear one radio fan inorming another "that static was awful last night," but how many fans teally know the meaning of the word? to use simple terms, static electricty is stationary. For instance, if you were to leave an aerial unrounded for any length of time, it buld collect electrons from the ectrified particles of the atomsphere. New, should a person touch this un-trounded aerial and stand on the damp soil, or any metal substance, he or she would receive an electric shock, due to this collection of stationary electricity becoming mobile through the person's body to ground. Hence we get the term static, meaning stationary electrons with no journey to go, until they can find a path to travel. Therefore when we connect our aerial to the receiving set, old man static has a nice easy path to go, to the discomfort of the radio fan. Another bugbear to the radio world is that phenomenon sometimes called blank periods, fading, or dead spots.

We in Newfoundland often have periods when reception is practically nil, sometimes lasting for two or three weeks. This is caused by magnetic belts, barring entirely, or else weakening radio waves in various

Magnetic belts are apparently caused by a series of sudden climatic changes. (I think all Newfoundlanders will agree on this point).
