Nunicipal Drainage Act. The Hon, Mr. McKellar has intro-dneed a bill—a copy of which we have before us—entitled an Act to authorise the investment of certain moneys in debentures to be issued for the construction of drainage works for municipalities. The Act provides that in case municipal Coun-cits, after procuring the report of competent engineers, are of opinion that the drainage of certain localities is necessary, they may pass by laws providing for the some, and borrow the necessary funds, on the credit of the municipality, by issuing debentures in sums of not less than one-hundred dollars each, and payable within fif-teen years from date, with interest at a rate of not less than five per centum per annum, the property be-nefited by such improvement to be taxed for the payment of the same. Before the final passing of the by-law it shall be published four weeks in some newspaper within the muni-cipality, or some other newspaper, together with a notice that any one intending to apply to have it quash-ed, must, within ten days of the pas-sing thereof, serve a notice in writ-mg upon the Reeve and Clerk of the municipality of his intention to make application for that purpose. 
