

For furniture, sewing machines, pianos, &c., et least \$1,500,000 is paid yearly to the Americans. Does this benefit either farmer, mechanic or manufacturer in this country, or help to employ the mechanics now wandering alle through the streets of our towns?

We are, at least, entitled to a direct answer to the question put to Mr. Stirton, and until such is given the manufacturers' influence will certainly not be east very strougly for him.
