ANCIENT ORDER OF FORESTERS.

The first annual meeting of the Supreme Circle of the Companions of the Forest of

Canada, held in Woodstock last week, was one full of interest to members of the order, and the reports indicated a prosperous condition of affairs, eleven new circles having been instituted since reorganization, about a year ago. There are now 24 circles in existence, with a membership of 1,510, and the circles have in their funds a cash

balance of \$2,756. There was a large amount of business disposed of, which the delegates strictly attended despite the long sessions. Supreme Chief Companion Buckingham, in the course of an admirable address pointed out the reasons for seceding from the American institution, chief among which was a desire to centralize governing

powers. He showed that as the Canadian and American Foresters were ruled by different high courts, it was inconsistent that the Canadian circles should be under other protection than the Canadian High Court, members of which only are eligible to membership in the circles in Canada, and the rapid increase in membership indicated that Foresters generally saw the wisdom of the contention that in union

there is strength. The report received the delegates' approval. Owing to the hasty manner in which the first set of laws were compiled, of necessity there existed many defects, but these were remedied after being carefully discussed. The new laws go into effect on Oct. 1. The Committee appointed to select the regalia presented its report, with a specimen of the regalia, to the delegates, and received the com-

commendation of the delegates for the excellent taste displayed. The badge consists of a circle of silver, stamped with the emblem of the order, secured to a bar of the same metal by two fine silver chains. There was a long discussion about the color of ribbon to be worn, but finally Foresters' green with a narrow red stripe was selected, the order for which will be immediately for-

warded to England, it being only obtainable there. At the earliest possible moment the supreme officers are to make an application for the order's incorporation. Among the delegates were a number of ladies, who took an active part in the deliberations of the meeting. On Wednesday morning an excellent photograph of the delegates was taken, grouped on the Central school lawn. The session

closed in the afternoon, to meet in London on the second Tuesday in August, 1893. High Chief Ranger Lanning and High Court Treasurer Griffiths spoke words of encouragement to the supreme delegates, and both predicted the success of the order. Comp. A. E. White, of South London, was elected D. D. S. C. C., and Comps. W. Richards and Mrs. Gibbling, of London, were elected auditors and trustees.
