The bride was Miss Wood, of this city, and the groom was supported by his cousin, Mr. Lancelot Guest. The bride received many presents, which were of a valuable and useful character.
Baptized in the River.
Although the baptism services at Clarke's bridge yesterday morning took place long before the time announced, a large crowd assembled to witness the proceedings. Rev. The Asylum Insurance Suit.
The last number of the Budget says: The Attorney General of Ontario vs. the matter of the insurance on the Asylum for the Insane, London, Ont., destruction of a section of the main building in December, 1905. The case was \$10,000,000, divided equally among the 24 companies. At the trial before the Assize Judges in Toronto, a jury was dispensed with by both parties. The judgment given for the Attorney General with costs. It was then taken to the Court of Appeal by the defendant companies, and now the unanimous judgment of the Court of Appeal has been rendered in favor of the plaintiff, the decision of the court below, thus leaving the victory with the Attorney-General, and confirming the view generally of authorities on insurance law.

Cummins; Thomas Steele, by William Taylor and R. H. Hesse. Short speeches were made by each of the candidates and their nominators, after which the ballot was taken for the choice of the meeting. Mr. Tooley was the favorite by thirteen votes. In the second ballot, in which he and Mr. Robson were the competitors.
Sudden Death of a Former Londoner.
Mr. Amos Armitage, section foreman of the T. Railway, who was suddenly yesterday afternoon, and was up town the day before yesterday. He was taken suddenly while seated in a chair at home yesterday, and died before the attending physician could be summoned. The deceased was an industrious and respected citizen, who has resided in the city since 1872. He came from section foreman G. T. R. He came from London, where he was employed on the switch gang, and had charge of the graveling of this section of the road. He leaves a wife, five sons and one daughter to mourn his sudden taking off. His eldest son, Amos, is employed in the G. T. R. shops, Windsor, and runs as fireman. His second son, George, is employed at Murray & Son's. The deceased was aged 44 years and 8 months. He was a member of St. Thomas Lodge, No. 76, and of the G. T. R. Provident Association. The funeral takes place to-morrow afternoon, and will be attended by the I. O. O. F. in a body. (St. Thomas Journal.)
