warm, with local thunder storms.

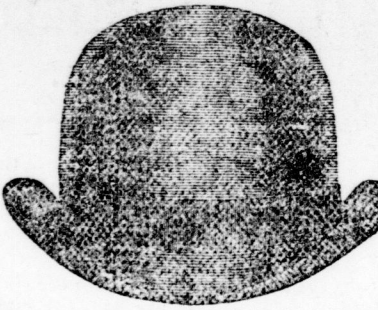
