Play Day
In LondonThe Largest Labor Celebration
Ever Held in This City.Parade Was a Marvel in
Size, Orderliness and
Organization.Fifteen Thousand People Attend
Sports and Games at
Queen's Park.Complete Absence of Disorder
a Marked Feature of
the Day.Not a Police Officer on the
Grounds or Track, but Per-
fect Order Prevailed.Cars Ran Till Nearly Midnight, but
Not One of Them Was Molested—
Day Was Quiet as Sunday, Say the
Police.

"It is our day off," said the workmen of London yesterday. And they knew just what to do with it, and how to make the most of it. After yesterday's celebration, Labor Day will always be remembered, in London at least, as the one great holiday of the year. It is a thing to be glad and proud of, that the workmen of London know as well how to play as how to work. Only those who earn a holiday know how to enjoy one, which explains the boyish light-heartedness and enthusiasm with which the workmen of London entered into the fun yesterday. The celebration proved, too, how splendidly organized are the workmen of this city, and gave an admirable illustration of the immense advantages of organization. The monster parade itself, with its thousands of marching men, and its many divisions of brigades and companies, presented a problem in organization and discipline that would have floundered any but a highly intelligent and perfectly organized body of laboring men.

"It was the most orderly, the best organized, and in every way the best parade I ever saw," said Chief of Police Williams last evening.

The long lines presented an almost military uniformity. Each of the forty or more different bodies fell into its appointed place in the procession without a hitch, and the parade moved off with the beautiful precision of a well-oiled machine. There was no haste, no flurry, no confusion, and no delay. The promptitude with which the first division moved off was a matter of surprise to many who were unfamiliar with the thoroughness of organization. It was a triumph of organization.

The same admirable efficiency was in evidence everywhere at Queen's Park. The enormous crowd of 15,000 people was handled with ease. The programme, which was so well filled that without capable direction it would have spun out for a week, went off swiftly, smoothly, and, above all, enjoyably.

Another cause for pride and congratulation was the demonstration yesterday by the labor unions of this city that their members are intelligent, order-loving, law-abiding, self-respecting citizens. Notwithstanding the presence of an irritant in the form of the street railway trouble, the men showed no hostility toward the street railway company except only to utterly ignore them and the cars. The cars were run until a late hour at night. They were running when the crowd was leaving Queen's Park in the evening. They were on Dundas street, though not running, when the parade passed along, but not a car was molested in any way. "It has been as quiet as Sunday," said the police last night.

QUEEN'S WEATHER.

Nature smiled on the celebration. The weather was perfect. The day opened bright and fine, and the sun shone brilliantly all day long. Light, cooling breezes, fragrant with the faint scent of fallen leaves and whispering of the coming of winter, tempered the summer heat.

Early in the morning groups of workmen, clad in their best, or else wearing the neat, simple uniform characteristic of their trade, which several of the unions selected to wear in the parade, began to appear on the streets, enjoying a leisurely stroll in the fresh morning air, and a pleasant chat with friends. The morning trains from St. Thomas brought many visitors. Long before noon Dundas street was crowded with citizens and visiting friends.

At 10:30 the Hamilton, Ingersoll and Woodstock delegations arrived over the G. T. R., and were met by the local committee and a brass band at the East London station. There were about 800 visitors from the labor organizations of the three western towns, Hamilton alone sending 500.

THE PARADE.

The arrangements for the parade had been made with the admirable forethought and a minute attention to detail. Each body or organization reported promptly at noon to Chief Marshal Wm. Davidson, at the corner of

It was a carriage pretty prettily canopied, and containing six children. One of them, a pretty little girl of 5 or 6, wore a gold crown and carried a scepter. She rode in state between a curly-headed mite of 4, wearing the uniform of a British soldier, on the one side, and an equally diminutive representative of her Majesty's navy on the other. Behind rode three maids of honor. Two black, liveried footmen marched at the horse's head. The little queen was the daughter of Mr. R. Comber, and represented "Britannia." The car shops' men carried banners bearing a painting of the superintendent's private car, and inscribed with the name of their organization.

The most gratifying feature of the procession was the splendid appearance of the individual members. Everywhere could be heard comments upon the fine physique and the manly, dignified bearing of the men. They gave the impression of intelligent, self-respect and mental and physical well-being.

AT THE PARK.

Upon the arrival of the procession at the park, and as soon as the crowd had got seated in the grand stand, Ald. Plant, on behalf of the Labor Day committee, extended a hearty welcome to the visitors. The demonstration served to show, the speaker emphasized, that the laboring men could do as well as the capitalists. Everything possible would be done to make the stay of the visitors so pleasant that they would be glad to come again. As it was a play day, he hoped the laboring men would spend the day in the park, and that they would make the most of it. During the past year, however, labor throughout the world had in many instances been brought into conflict with capital.

A voice—What about the street railway strike?

"We are not going to discuss that today, my friend," replied Ald. Plant. "We do not wish to flaunt our strength in the face of those opposed to us."

Ald. Plant then introduced Mr. Richard Jose, president
