HARBIN AND IRKUTSK-SACKED AND FIRED; STREETS OF RIGARUNNING WITH BLOOD

Manchurian Mutineers Seize Vast Stores, Bombard Cities With Great Slaughter, and Defeat Loyal Troops-Anarchy Rampant in All Parts of the Empire.

New York, Dec. 11.-According to the American this morning the London Daily Telegraph's advice from Moji, Japan, telling of the bombardment of Harbin by Russian military mutineers, says also that Irkutsk was burned and sacked. The city is in ruins. In Harbin the rebels created

General Madriloff, commanding the loyal troops, engaged the rebels. DREADFUL SLAUGHTER AT HARBIN.

Refugees from Eastern Siberia say the mutineers journeyed to Vladivostock on a captured express train and seized vast military stores there, consisting of Maxim rifles, and cartridges, with several field pieces. Then they returned to Harbin and began the bombardment. The rebels included some of the best marksmen in the army. Their shots all told. Bullets taked the main thoroughfare. Even the hospitals were riddled by the rapid fire balls. Patients were killed in their cots.

IRKUTSK SACKED AND FIRED.

Irkutsk was sacked from end to end and fired in a dozen places. Rebels marched through the streets singing. The refugees fled to the mountains and villages.

MUTINEERS HAD ABLE LEADER.

The arrival of General Madriloff was greeted with cries of rage by the mutineers, who fought with even greater intensity. They had a leader who was handling them with skill. His name is not known. Many innocent Russian and Chinese residents of Harbin were killed.

A late dispatch from Moji stated that Madriloff was retreating before the rebels and Harbin would share the fate of Irkutsk.

RAN DOWN BRITISH SHIP.

A dispatch from Tokio to London says a Russian destroyer at Vladivostock deliberately ran down a British steamship which had to ground to avoid foundering. The Japanese residents of Vladivostock are safe from the mutineers, who, however, treasure an intense hatred of the British.

"THE REACTION HAS COME."

St. Petersburg, Dec. 10.-Morning, via Eydtkuhnen, Dec. 11.-There is every indication today that the Government's challenge will be accepted and that within 48 hours a general strike throughout Russia will be ordered. A terrible storm has been raised by the arrest of M. Krustaleff, president of the executive committee of the Workmen's Council, which was followed during the night by the imprisonment of the members of the Workmen's Council, and a number of Socialistic leaders. "The reaction has come," were the words on every lip, and in the Liberal extremist camp there was only one opinion, namely, that it must be resisted to the bitter end. At all the meetings last night, some of which lasted until morning, the opinion was unanimous that the Government had forced the hands of the proletariat, and the supreme weapon, a general strike, must be invoked.

EDITORS DEFY THE GOVERNMENT.

The newspaper editors at yesterday evening's meeting decided that the temporary press law forbidding the discussion of vital questions affecting the welfare of the nation violated the principles of freedom of speech and of the press guaranteed by the imperial manifesto, and that it must be defied. The result was that the editions of the Russ and half a dozen more radical papers were confiscated. The employes of the Riga-Orel Railroad have declared a strike on account of the declaration of martial law in Livonia, and have sent an appeal to the other roads to to join. Last night the railroad men of the Baltic lines decided to follow the example of the Riga-Orel men. The situation in Livonia is frightful.

3,106 PASSENGERS ON BOARD

Magnificent New Cunarder Has Tonnage of 30,000, Eight Decks, and a Speed of 19 1-2 Knots.

New York, Dec. 11.-The first transto this port, the giant new Carmania, dock today. All the way across the tempting to enter. During the night the wind decreased in force, and with daylight, the Carmania turned her nose circuitous channel.

The maiden voyage of the big turbine was in every way successful. Despite the severe weather a fairly even speed was maintained throughout. The size of the Carmania may be partially realized from the fact that 3.106 persons made the voyage. Of these 2.656 were passengers. She carried a crew of 450 men. The Carmania is 670 feet in length of 30,000 tons displacement and has eight decks. She has triple screws, and made 191% knots an hour on her builder's trial trip. She is a sister ship of the Caronia, which was launched less than a year ago, and which is equipped with the old style

Illinois Clamors for Reciprocity; Will Head a National Appeal.

Chicago, Dec. 11.-The conditions which are rapidly driving large manufacturing interests from the United States to Canada are to be considered within a few days by the Illinois Manufacturing Association. Reports just gathered show that 132 of the leading concerns of the country have been obliged, chiefly on account of tariff restriction, to establish branch plants in Canada. The agitation which the Illinois manufacturers are about to start is expected to assume the form of a national appeal to Congress. The remedy most in favor locally and throughout the country provides for reciprocity legislation which will permit of the freer exchange of American and Canadian manufactured products. It is likely that Congress will be asked during the present session to take steps in this direction.


