Woodstock, Oct. 9.—The night operator at the C. P. R. station here, which is on the outskirts of the city, was held up by masked burglars at 2:35 this morning, and his silver watch and chain, \$10 25 of personal funds, and \$52 20 of office money was taken. The latter was secured by prying open the till. The first indication Operator Harry Southcote had of anything wrong was when he heard "hands up" called out. He turned and saw a man pointing a revolver at him through the ticket wicket. His hands promptly went up. The second masked man then climbed over the partition, and with a rope and a strap securely tied the operator's hands and feet, after which they rifled his pockets and the till in a businesslike manner and decamped.
