THE "GOLDEN RULE" IN MAKING ARRESTS

Two Many Juveniles Taken Up Says the Cleveland Chief of Police.

Buffalo, June 16.—Major Richard Sylvester, chief of the police of Washington, and president of the International Association of Chiefs of Police, in opening today's convention of that organization, declared that it was a source of gratification to observe that the tendency in policing throughout the country is decidedly in the direction of general uniformity, and it must follow that the efforts of this association will within the next few years redound in the evolving of one general system; this, however, on the hypothesis that those engaged in the conduct of state and municipal affairs will encourage efforts in that direction. Foreign and domestic detective interests, he said, call for the adoption of the closest relationship and a liberal interchange and unity of action.

Chief Sylvester said that it occurred to him that the general movement should, by appropriate resolution, accompanied by provision for entertainment, tender an invitation to foreign governments that they delegate their respective police heads to gather in a "police congress" with those of the United States, which should prove an important seconding of the efforts carried on by the association, without expense to the state or general government.

Fred Kohler, chief of police of Cleveland, Ohio, addressed the convention on the golden rule policy of making or not making arrests which has been adopted by the department of which he is the head.

The golden rule system which, the speaker said, has now been in successful operation for seventeen months, grew out of the speaker's observation of police court routine. He had seen daily an almost endless procession of prisoners, including a large percentage of juveniles, charged with minor offenses, a large proportion of whom were subsequently discharged when their cases had been lifted.

These latter went away, but bearing the stigma of the police court, which humiliation in itself enhanced the possibility of a second arrest. Incident to these arrests were the inevitable groups of aged and weeping parents, distressed, some with babies in their arms, friends of the accused tempted to commit perjury in their behalf, and frequently the game of blackmailing witnesses, abetted by lawyers, professional bondsmen, etc.

A systematic inquiry, extending over a considerable period, convinced Chief Kohler that many of these first offenders were not so bad, after all, and that most of them had committed their offenses through thoughtlessness, natural passion, or in a spirit of frolic or mischief. Firm in the conviction that the policeman was the best judge and should be the final judge of the character of the offender, he decided to constitute every police officer a sort of a magistrate, who should pass upon minor offenses before bringing the offender before a formal court of justice. The result, he said, had been to decrease the arrests to two-thirds in a year's time.

HARRIMAN GETS IT.

New York, June 17.—The sale of the Central of Georgia Railway to the Illinois Central Railroad, carrying out plans forecasted more than a year ago, was announced today. The transaction originated in negotiations culminating in November, 1907, when the entire capital stock passed into the hands of William Nelson Cromwell and John W. Castles.

The purchase, it was announced, was to be transferred to the Illinois Central. The price paid by Harriman for the stock to the per value of \$5,000,000, it was stated, was \$3,000,000, or at the rate of \$60 per share.

SAYS MURDERED WOMAN.

Winnipeg, Man., June 15.—Charles S. Hornbeck, a farm laborer and Barnardo boy, who was employed by C. F. Wastie, near Oak Bluff, Man., has confessed to having murdered Mrs. Louis James at her home, Dominion street, here, on the afternoon of April 22 last. He was placed under arrest by provincial police yesterday.

There is every reason to believe that the confession is the result of a disorganized imagination, and that on investigation it will be proved that Hornbeck knows absolutely nothing about the murder, further than what he has read.
