HON. MR. BECK MADE SPEECH

Addressed the Ratepayers From the Window of The Advertiser Office.

The artesian wells bylaw carried last evening by a majority of 1,840 in a total vote cast of 2,550.

The main extension bylaw was defeated by 548 in a vote over 300 votes

The opposition was a negligible quantity. The total of the votes cast against the artesian scheme amounted to 385, the proportion being 6 to 1 in favor of the Beck wells.

W.S. WILSON DIES IN ST. CATHRINES

A Former Well-Known Lawyer and Oil Reliner of London Has Passed Away,

SUFFERED FROM CANCER

Was at One Time in Partnership With Hon. William Proudfoot in Hamilton-A Well-Known Liberal.

The death is announced in St. Catharines, Ont., of Mr. William Stewart Wilson, a former resident and well-known lawyer and oil refiner of this city.

Mr. Wilson left London close onto twenty years ago. He had left the bar and had entered the oil refining business, remaining in that line and the maufacture of soap for over 20

Whe he first came here, about 1871 he entered into partnership in the oil refining business with the late Ira V. Thompson, the premises being located on the corner of Nelson street and Adelaide, where the soap works of S. F. Lawrason are now located. The late Mr. Wilson always retined his interest in the legal profession,


