FRUIT CROP LOOKS LIKE A BUMPER ONE

Abundance of Apples, Peaches, Pears and Plums This Fall.

Local fruit dealers and grocers are looking forward to an exceptionally busy time this week as the preserving season commences right away. On Saturday the largest consignments of peaches and plums of the season were on sale at the market, and brought good prices. Among the offerings were three carloads of peaches from the Niagara district, and the fruit this year is of splendid quality, and found a ready sale. Both dealers and growers say that there is going to be a splendid supply of first-class pears and plums, as the trees all through the county are loaded with the fruiting point. It is a long time, they state, since plums and pears have been so plentiful, and there is no probability of prices being very high for either of these favorite fruits. Apples, particularly the later varieties, promise to be a bumper crop, and although packers are busy going through the country making arrangements for thousands of barrels, there will be plenty to meet home demands. It is stated that the western markets will take more apples this year than ever before, and that this market will in a few years more be Ontario's principal buyer.

SABBATH SERVICE IN CITY CHURCHES

Large Congregations Hear Discourses From Many of the City Pulpits.

There was a large congregation at both services in the First Presbyterian Church yesterday to welcome Rev. J. Gibson Inkster, who has just returned from his holiday in Scotland. In the morning, Mr. Inkster based his sermon on the text, John xvii, 15, "I pray not that thou shouldst take them out of the world, but that thou shouldst keep them from the evil."

Mr. Inkster pointed out that there are two classes of people, who are always anxious to be taken out of the world, the aged sick and the young convert. In the case of the latter, he said, it is God's will that they remain in order that they develop strong characters and help extend Christ's kingdom. The only way to develop character is in action. Had the late Cecil Rhodes made the most of his opportunities he would not have said at the close of his life, "So much to do and so little done," but would rather have spoken as Paul did, "I have fought a good fight, my work is done."

First Methodist.

Rev. Mr. Whiting spoke in the morning at the First Methodist Church from the text, Matt. iv, 4, "Man shall not live by bread alone, but by every word that proceedeth out of the mouth of God."

"The words that Jesus sanctioned," said the speaker, mean more to us than the words which He did not sanction. A passage of the Old Testament acquires four-fold worth when Jesus uses the words himself. And so the word of the text comes with a double force.

The life of man that can be fed by bread alone is only a very small part of life. We are too busy trying to weigh out how much avoidable weight of divinity there is in Christ and how much humanity. But Jesus does not attempt to separate himself from man. If he had said, "Take that temptation away, take it to some ordinary man who always likes to be comfortable, you surely know that this does not affect me." If he had said this he would have separated himself forever from all humanity.

The psychologist and metaphysician says that a great part of the brain is will, emotion, thought, yet there is something beyond which he does not know. The moralist talks of conscience, yet there is something more beyond his horizon. There is a section of our lives that is summed up in the words, faith, hope and love, and this every section of a man's life is fed out of the mouth of God.

Moses received the law on tables of stone from God, and this is tabling to us every day, and the law of God is engraved on our hearts. And God's biggest work to feed man's greatest need is Jesus Christ.

Dundas Centre.

Rev. Dr. Manning occupied his pulpit at the Dundas Centre Church this morning for the first time since his holidays. He spoke from the text I Cor. xv, 55, "O death, where is thy sting? O grave, where is thy victory?"

This was a great saying, said the speaker, and one of the things that were great would be compared to this great saying.

"The victory over death," he continued, "is the greatest of all victories. Christ dealt with death, and the great victory of most of his teachings had to do with death. It is a mistake when people say that the gospel referred to this life without relation to the next. It was the promises of the future that made the present life bearable. So it is that in their sudden bereavements people can say, 'The Lord gave and the Lord has taken away, blessed be the name of the Lord, because they realized that they would meet again in a better world.'

We overcome death by overcoming sin. A converted man at once loses the fear of death, and there is no matter how long a man may have lived, or how well he must in the end depend on Christ alone."

Both services at the Askin Street Methodist Church yesterday were conducted by Mr. Matthews, a student of Victoria College. Large congregations were present on both occasions, and Mr. Matthews remarks were much appreciated.

PASSENGER TRAFFIC IS VERY HEAVY

Saturday Was the Busiest Day of the Season on Both Big Roads.

A new record was made on the Grand Trunk out of London on Saturday evening, when Conductor McKenzie left in charge of Express No. 5, with 1,004 passengers. The train was made up of thirteen cars, and is a fair sample of the holiday traffic. Railway men are unanimous in stating that Saturday was the busiest day of the season, and the cause was the combined traffic due to Toronto fair, special rates for Labor Day, and the unusually heavy summer tourist traffic.

The International Limited went through last night in two sections, and No. 7, the early morning express, was also sent through in two sections, there being nine cars in each. Either one of these would be a big train ordinarily.

Heavy on C. P. R.

The C. P. R. also report that traffic is unusually heavy, and all trains east and west are carrying extra coaches to accommodate the crowds.

Even now until the end of the month will be an extremely busy time in the passenger traffic department.

In the freight department business is good also, and a splendid season is looked for. There is a big demand for box cars and refrigerator cars, and great quantities of dairy produce and fruit is moving.

The big rush of the grain movement is not yet felt here beyond the call for all available cars, but in a short time thousands of bushels will be in transit. Ore shipments are moving steadily, and quite a lot of through business is being done in stock.
