HAMILTON IS CHARGED WITH ELECTRICITY

Experts Fear That There Will Be a Serious and Fatal Explosion Shortly.

Hamilton, Ont., March 2.-That there is grave danger from explosions due to electrolysis pitting gas mains is emphasized by former City Engineer Barrow in a letter to the press, and that it is not exaggerated is evident from a surprising discovery made at the city hospital this week.

The gas and water pipes in the institution are so heavily charged with electricity that frequently the nurses in making up the iron beds have received shocks that have thrown them half-way across the room. It is feared contact with the stream of water, that unless something is done before the gas pipes are eaten away there will be a big explosion, with great loss of life, at the hospital.

Tests have been made which show

that every pipe in the institution is affected. At time the electrolysis is so noticeable in some of the iron beds that patients toss restlessly about at night. The hospital governors have taken the matter up with the city
