HAY PRICES UNCHANGED ON LOCAL MARKET

One Load Brought a Top-Notch Price, But the Others Sold Below This.

The attendance at the local market today was the smallest of any market day during the last three weeks. The only offerings were a few load of hay, vegetables and apples.

Hay has been more plentiful during the last few days, but the prices have not changed and yesterday one load of good quality was sold for \$17.00, which is the highest price paid during the last month. The other C. N. R. W. R. bonds. loads were sold at prices ranging from \$14.00 to \$16.50 per ton, with the average seiling price about \$16.00. the usual rate.
