

LITTLE GIRL KIDNAPPED RECENTLY LEFT A FORTUNE

Margaret Scanlon, of Arthur, While on Her Way to School—
Seized by Unknown Man, Who Drove
Away With Her.

Arthur, June 10.—Margaret Scanlon, a school child aged 8 years, was abducted here by an unknown man this morning, and no information as to her whereabouts has been obtained by her relatives up to a late hour tonight. Expectation of a ransom is believed to be the motive for the act.

The little girl, who recently came in for a large sum of money under the terms of a will, left her home in this place at the usual hour this morning to go to school. She was not accompanied, as she had only a short distance to walk, and crimes of violence are the last thing anyone would expect in this quiet community.

Margaret was almost at the school

when she was accosted by a stranger, who stood beside a waiting horse and buggy. Under the eyes of a number of passersby, but before they had time to run up to the assistance of the child, the man seized the child in his arms and hurled her into the vehicle. He immediately sprang into the seat beside her and drove away at a break-neck pace, the girl screaming piteously all the while.

There were several eye-witnesses of the abduction, but none has been able to give a satisfactory description of the man. Search parties were organized at once, and the surrounding villages communicated with, but no trace of the course taken by the buggy has yet been obtained.

Fast Flying by French Aviators

Made 674 Miles in Four Hundred and Twenty-Four Minutes.

Berlin, June 10.—Maurice G. Brindejono, a remarkable flight today from Villacoublay, near Paris, to the Johannisthal aerodrome, outside Berlin, in the competition for the Kommercy Cup, doing the distance of 674 miles in an airline in 7 hours and 4 minutes, or approximately a mile in 37.4 seconds.

He started from Villacoublay at 4 o'clock this morning, and arrived at Johannisthal at 12:04 noon (11:04 Paris time), making only one landing at Wanne, between 8 and 9 o'clock.

The aviator twice unsuccessfully attempted to win the last semi-annual competition for the trophy with flights from Paris to Berlin, being beaten by Ernest F. Guillaux, who flew from Biarritz to Kellum, Holland, nearly 1,000 miles.

Will Lynch Murderer If He Is Captured

Bloodhounds Are Now On Trail of
Lumberjack Desperado.

Sault Ste. Marie, Ont., June 10.—A shooting is not unlikely, judging from the feeling of the people over the killing of the two deputies at Brimley on Friday night, and already special precautions are being taken to take care of the murderer when caught. The chase was fired today by a number of bloodhounds, which have been sent for to Petoskey, and which will arrive at Wellers' siding at noon, where the outlaw was last seen yesterday afternoon by Forester Green. The ten deputy marshals which were kept up yesterday on the revenue cutter Vigilant, are patrolling the south shore, and from the location of the man when last seen it would appear that he had seen his pursuers and had made off by land again. Even women are seen along the country roads by locomotive crews carrying revolvers and guns. The funeral of the victims was held yesterday afternoon, and all business places in the village of Brimley were closed.

TWO ELECTIONS

Writs Issued For Hanley and Cumberland Counties.

Idle Rich Producing New Criminal Class

Chiefs of Police in Convention Dis-
cuss Difficult Problem.

Washington, June 10.—The tremendous growth of wealth, with all its consequent increase in the number of "idle rich," is producing a class of criminals in this country almost faster than the police can cope with it, according to Representative Borland, of Missouri, who today addressed the convention of the International Association of Chiefs of Police.

Mr. Borland declared that the "idle rich" set a pernicious example in their search for amusement and aroused a desire of emulation in the minds of persons of small means.

The result of such an example, he said, was to tempt poorer folk into indiscretions and crime to obtain money with which to gratify newly-acquired tastes. The cabaret show, he declared, to be one of the many causes for the spread of the social evil.

Held for Theft of \$1,500 at Porcupine

Clean-Up Man Alleged to Have Stolen
Gold Amalgam.

Porcupine, June 11.—Charged with stealing \$1,500 in gold amalgam C. Keath, the clean-up man at the McIntyre mine, is to appear in court here today.

He was quitting the job, it is alleged, and leaving the mine without his time check. A search warrant was sworn out by the McIntyre Mines and the rooms of Keath searched, and in a grip in the room and on the man's person was found, it is alleged, over \$1,500 worth of gold amalgam. This is the first case on record in the north country of the theft of gold amalgam from the plates of the Northern Stamp Mills.

Keath was arrested as he was leaving work for the last time at the mill, and a couple of pounds of amalgam was found in his clothes, while all told the \$1,500 worth of gold ore found in his grip and clothes weighed about twelve or fifteen pounds. The stealing had evidently been going on at the small stamp mill of the McIntyre for some time, the employee evidently caching only small portions at a time. His intentions of leaving, it is understood, were communicated to other employees, and when the management found out that their employee was not giving notice, and leaving without his time check, suspicion was aroused, which resulted in the search warrant being sworn out before Magistrate Torrance, and the recovery of the amalgam.

It is thought by the management that all of the gold has been recovered and that Keath was unable to get away with any of the precious metal. Keath was arrested immediately the amalgam was located. He was lodged in the Timmins jail to await trial. Keath has been employed on the plates at the mine since early this year, and was considered a trustworthy employee.

NOT IN SYMPATHY

Niece of "First Martyr" Dislikes the
Suffragettes' Tactics.

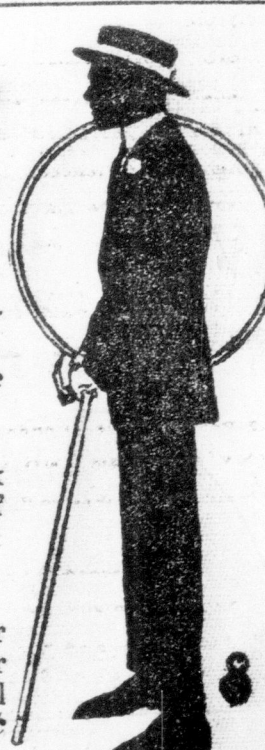
