BRILLIANT SCENE AT THE ARMORIES

I. O. O. F. Decoration of Chivalry
Bestowed on Four
Ladies.

LARGE CROWD ATTENDS

Unique Ceremony Made a Beautiful
and Interesting Pageant.

The Decoration of Chivalry was
conferred on four lady members of
the I. O. O. F. in the armories on
Thursday evening. Brigadier-General
Dr. G. M. Hermon, of Toronto, com-
mander for Ontario of the Patriarchs
Military, I. O. O. F., conferred the de-
coration on Mrs. George E. Logan and
Mrs. Garrett Stack, of Victoria Rebe-
kah Lodge, and Mrs. Richard Johnston
and Miss Annie Buskard, of May Queen
Lodge.

In Full Regalia.
Headed by the Seventh Regiment
Band the London Canton No. 1 and
Victoria Canton No. 6, St. Thomas,
marched in full regalia from the city
hall to the armories where the decoration
was conferred. The Patriarchs
Militant were in full uniform of purple
and gold, and made a very imposing
sight on the floor of the armories,
where they had charge of the cere-
mony. The four ladies were escorted
by the guard through a lane of uni-
formed patriarchs with drawn swords
to the end of the hall, where the
decoration was conferred by Brigadier-
General G. M. Hermon. The cere-
mony was attended by 200 spectators,
who watched the proceedings with
great interest.

Ladies' Drill.
After the bestowal of the decoration,
which is a white enamel medal, with a
ruby heart in the centre, surmounted
with a gold cross, the ladies perform-
ed some fancy drills, and gave an
exhibition of military marching. Every-
thing worked like a smoothly-running
piece of machinery, and the audience
were highly delighted. At the close of
the evening refreshments were served
to all present.

GAVE HIS LIFE TO AID SCIENCE

Hartford, Conn., July 11.—
Berton E. Baker, inventor of the
Baker X-ray tube and other
machines of that type, is dead
at his home here today, follow-
ing an illness since last Sep-
tember, since which time no
less than nine operations were
made by scientists in Philadel-
phia, New York and Hartford
in a vain effort to save his life.
He was virtually a victim of
constant exposure to the X-ray,
and despite warnings of his
danger four years ago, he had
kept at his work until he had
perfected one of the very best
machines on the market.
Baker was born in New Brit-
tain Aug. 19, 1870. He received
a common school education, and
became interested in science in
his early days. He never studied
in a school of higher education.

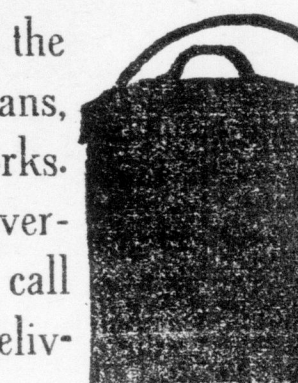

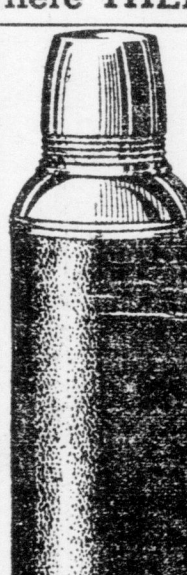
