REV. DAVID RYAN, ARED 84,

DIES IN WESTMINSTER TP.

Was Born in Ireland and Entered

Methodist Ministry When Only

Eighteen.

Rev. David Ryan, a superannuated

minister of the Methodist Church, died

Wednesday night at his residence of his

son-in-law, David Gilbert, 107, con-

cession 4, Delaware Township, in his

58th year.

He was born in Ireland and entered

the ministry at 18 years of age. He

formerly held a number of pastorates

in Western Ontario, and after coming

to Western Ontario held charges at

Burford, Elmhurst and Wardville. He

was superannuated 20 years ago. His

wife died a number of years ago. He

is survived by three daughters, Mrs.

David Gilbert, of Delaware Township;

Mrs. Leonard Wilkins, of the townline;

Westminster Township; Miss Lilly Ry-

an, of Edmonton, and two sons, Ed-

ward, of Edmonton, and Frank, of

Stratford.

The funeral will be held Saturday

afternoon at 2 o'clock from the resi-

dence of his son-in-law, Leonard Wil-

to Mount Pleasant Cemetery. Funeral

the use of yeast or similar prepara-
