Since that time Mr. Giles' eagle eye has ever turned to the bosom of the afore-mentioned Mother Thames, and on Saturday afternoon he was rewarded by seeing Romeo the Great snatching a few minutes sleep while he basked under the smiling rays of Old Sol.

"Ah ha," said Mr. Giles dramatically, as he slid down the bank to the river. "Romeo, thou shalt come back to me."

To make a long story short, Romeo proved that he was not in a class with the much-lamented James J. Jeffries for he "came back" to his cage. There was great rejoicing at the park when the glad news went abroad that Mr. Giles had snatched Romeo roughly, a la one of those well-known Amazons or a disgruntled wife, and had borne him in triumph to the zoo.

However, the worst is yet to come. The stage is darkened. It is night-fall. "He who laughs last laughs best," murmurs Romeo in alliteration, as he works at his prison cell. "Oof, oof, Juliet will be surprised when she finds I have flown," and indeed Juliet was. Mr. Giles was grieved, only more so, when he discovered that Romeo had snatched off Sunday night to his second love, the River Thames.

FOUR CAPITAL CHARGES ON FALL ASSIZE DOCKET

One Murder and Three Manslaughter Charges To Be Tried.

The fall assizes will open on Monday, October 30th, at 10 o'clock at the court house, with Mr. Justice Middleton presiding.

On the criminal docket are four capital charges to be tried.

Mike Tancred, a forerunner, is charged with the murder of Raffaele Bartolo, a fellow countryman, on April 20th, at a Hamilton road board-house.

During his incarceration at the county jail since then Tancred has been a model prisoner, according to the officials of the jail.

John G. McIntyre of Glencoe is charged with manslaughter, the crown claiming suspicious circumstances in connection with the death of his daughter, Irene McIntyre. It is alleged that he refused to summon medical assistance during a critical illness of the young woman.

Richard Atkinson will answer to a charge of manslaughter as the result of an accident in which a motor car driven by him struck Daniel Pritchett of this city, who died afterwards. The verdict at the inquest was that Pritchett died as the result of injuries sustained by being knocked down by the car driven by Atkinson.

Atkinson is a Biddulph Township farmer, and will attempt to prove that the accident was the result of a defective steering gear. The crown will introduce evidence to show that Atkinson was intoxicated, and was criminally negligent in his driving.

Joseph Preme, the Grand Trunk watchman, will be tried on a charge of manslaughter as the result of a collision, when a motor fire truck from No. 1 fire hall was struck at the Talbot street crossing, by a heavy freight train and Capt. John C. Kelly.

Preme lifted the crossing gates to permit the fire truck to pass just as one freight train had cleared the crossing, but he failed to notice the approach of a freight from the opposite direction.

A large volume of evidence will be introduced in all cases, and the assizes are expected to last some days.

SANITATION IN CITY NOT WHAT IT OUGHT TO BE, SAYS M. O. H.

Outside Toilets for Majority of Citizens.

FIVE DIPHTHERIA DEATHS

Board of Health Hears Report on Statistics for September.

That there are 6,764 outside toilets in the city of London with 12,000 homes was the startling statement made to the board of health yesterday afternoon by Dr. H. W. Hill, medical officer of health. The inspectors of the department have been making a house-to-house canvass, and their figures were used.

"At the present rate of going, it will take about fifty years to get rid of these nuisances, even if the city does not grow any," commented Dr. Hill.

That more than fifty per cent of the people use out-of-date methods of taking care of refuse is regarded by the board as startling. The board will take steps to find a remedy for the evil, but Controller Rose presented a complaint about the junk yard of Gootson Bros., but Assistant Health Inspector Scott informed the board that it was in first-class condition. No action was taken.

100 Infectious Cases.

During the month of September, 100 cases of infectious diseases were discovered—1 chickenpox, 22 diphtheria, 1 measles, 3 polio-myelitis or infantile paralysis, 1 scarlet fever, 5 typhoid fever and 52 whooping cough. There were 10 deaths from these diseases—5 from diphtheria, 1 polio-myelitis, typhoid and 3 whooping cough. There were some complications in some of the deaths, but the majority were placed in the class of the disease first noted.

Five Diphtheria Deaths.

At a isolation hospital 19 cases of diphtheria were admitted, and 12 were discharged. There were 5 deaths from this disease. There were also 29 cases of scarlet fever, of which 16 were discharged. No cases of scarlet fever were discovered, and two were discharged from the hospital.

Miss Barons, the tuberculosis nurse, reported that 24 cases were reported at the dispensary, of which 16 were new cases. There were 6 deaths during the month.

STREET RAILWAY MUST SWEEP OFF MORE SNOW

Board of Works to Prepare Bylaw for This Winter.

The board of works at its meeting last evening decided to prepare a by-law to extend the present snow-clearing operations of the London street railway. The company will be required to clean the snow from the tracks on Richmond street one half mile north and south in addition to the present area covered, and on Ridout to clear the tracks from Elmwood to Ferguson streets in London South. Accounts were passed and other routine business transacted.

INTERESTING LECTURE TO HISTORICAL SOCIETY

Frank Yelch Gives Illustrated Talk on "Canada in Peace and War."

The London and Middlesex Historical Society last evening opened its 1916-17 season with a largely-attended meeting in the Normal School, when the special attraction was an illustrated lecture on the subject, "Canada in Peace and War," by Frank Yelch.

Introducing his subject, Mr. Yelch, who needed no introduction to a London gathering, stated that his object in giving the travelogue was to show Canada in peace in order to emphasize the immunity from war enjoyed in this country, the freedom from the dread of falling bombs.

Both the first and second parts of the lecture, the latter giving glimpses of the soldiers of Canada and of the Allies, were contrasted to times when the people who stay safely at home in Canada are feeling of grave responsibility towards the war, and to the men who have gone to the front.

An evidence that this lecture was met with popularity was to be found in the fact that last evening's presentation of the 55th within the past few months.

Regarding at quaint old Quebec, the lecturer showed a series of beautiful pictures which gave a good view of all the way across Canada, including cities, waterways, glimpses of rural life, historic pictures of Toronto and Niagara by way of contrast with the present, mountain climbing in the Rockies, views of the Pacific coast, then sweeping back, photos of troops leaving Toronto, and the first Canadian contingent at Valcartier.

Over the ocean in transports the audience followed the first boys who went forth from Canada to fight for King and country.

Visits were paid to historic places in old London, to the picturesque villages and the immense training camps of England.

Next came exciting moments with the fleet, on dreadnoughts and by submarines.

Now, it was the field of battle in Flanders; again a rocky peak gained by the Italian army.

The audience broke into hearty applause when a chapel in Westminster Abbey was shown, and in it the colors of a Kingston regiment deposited there, to be called for by the survivors of the unit after the war.

Mr. Yelch was obliged to hasten towards the close of his lecture in order to catch the train for Chicago.

A. G. Stevenson of the Normal School staff presided.

HAMILTON TO HAVE STEAM AUXILIARY

Engineer There Says It Is Necessary for Waterworks.

Engineer Bain, Hamilton, has informed the utilities commission of that city that it is necessary to install an auxiliary steam plant for the waterworks there, capable of handling 20,000,000 gallons of water a day, and Mr. Bain thinks that in addition to the hydro power there should be a capacity of 20,000,000 gallons, for all emergencies.

Commissioner F. G. Mitchell here has been suggesting the same remedy for London's difficulties, and it will probably be acted on.

General-Manager E. V. Buchanan is obtaining figures on the cost of engines that will burn crude oil.

Charlton of the Merchants' Bank, Montreal, was united in marriage to Lieut. Wallace Edward of the 190th Battalion, younger son of the Hon. Edward and Mrs. Brown, Wellington Crescent, Winnipeg.

The ceremony was a quiet one, only immediate relatives being present. Dr. Hodgson rendered appropriate wedding prayer.

The dainty little bride, who was given away by her stepfather, George H. Edmonson, and was unattended, wore her traveling suit of dark blue cheviot trimmed with white, broadcloth, the coat opening over a blouse of pale yellow and white georgette crepe.
