

HALF OF GREEK ARMY ORDERED TO DISBAND

King Signs Decree in Compliance With Allies' Wishes.

ATHENS, Oct. 24.—(Via London, Oct. 27.—Delayed.)—In compliance with assurances given to the French minister, the King today signed a decree releasing from active service half of the class of 1915 now with the colors, as well as other miscellaneous levies under training. This reduces the military force in Greece from 60,000 to 35,000, thus disposing of the difference between Greece and the Entente powers on the ground of danger from the Greek army to the Entente armies in the Orient.

Claims Politics Is Behind Villa in New Attack

U. S. Secretary of War Says Assault It To Be Made on Americans.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 26.—Secretary of War Baker announced late today that the war department had received definite information that enemies of the Government's policy toward Mexico, in co-operation with Villa or other bandits, had arranged for a spectacular attack to be made before the election to create sentiment against the Administration. Full particulars of the plan, the secretary said, have been forwarded to Gen. Funston and Pershing, and all American forces are in readiness for the attack.

MORE GERMANS ON THE WESTERN FRONT THAN EVER BEFORE

Gen. Maurice Says They Have Not Been Removed.

FOE BECOMING "JUMPY"

Knows He Is Beaten and Sees Big Dangers Everywhere.

LONDON, Oct. 26.—The idea that German effectives have been removed from the western front for duty elsewhere is a mistaken one, said Major-Gen. F. B. Maurice, chief director of military operations at the war office, in an interview today.

"There are more German divisions on the western front today than ever," he declared.

The slowing down of the British offensive on the Somme front has been entirely due to weather conditions, Gen. Maurice explained.

"Despite the minor importance of the British operations during the past fortnight," said he, "you must notice that the German official communiques frequently state that heavy attacks have been repulsed. Such statements are purely imaginary."

Losses Are Minimum. "Our operations, while destined to improve our positions, have been accomplished with minimum losses to ourselves, while inflicting the heaviest possible losses on the Germans."

"Our chief operation was the occupation of the brow of the ridge extending from Le Sars to Thiepval, which was dominated by the Schwaben regiment. A brigade order captured from the Germans state that the regiment must be recaptured at any cost, and offers members of German regiments fourteen days' leave for every English prisoner brought in. The order explains that the holding of this line by the British enables them to overlook the whole German artillery position in the valley of the Ancre, exposing the same to destruction."

Germans Are "Jumpy." Gen. Maurice commented that the German statements were probably to be explained by the fact known to every old soldier that, when an enemy loses the ascendancy, he becomes "jumpy," and magnifies every minor operation into a determined attack. Consequently, if there is an exchange of artillery fire, and this is not followed up by a British infantry attack, the Germans, according to Gen. Maurice's theory, think they have repulsed an important movement.

PASTOR HAD NINE WIVES AND SECURED \$500,000

Minister Just Deceased at Poughkeepsie Was Champion Swindler.

POUGHKEEPSIE, N. Y., Oct. 26.—Arthur Worthington, former pastor of the Presbyterian Church in New Hamburg, N. Y., was today deposed from the ministry and excommunicated from the Presbyterian Church by a trial commission of ministers and laymen of the North River Presbytery. He was found guilty of bigamy, swindling, fraud and blasphemy.

The evidence secured, after two years' investigation, showed that Worthington had nine wives and was known under eleven aliases. His right name is Samuel Oakley Crawford. Records show he served two prison terms for fraud, one in Albany, N. Y., and one in Melbourne, Australia.

His operations covered the United States, Canada, Europe and the Antipodes. In his activities he secured, by false pretences, more than \$500,000, it is alleged. The deposed minister disappeared from Poughkeepsie five weeks ago and cannot be found.

RUSSIANS DESTROYED STORES IN CONSTANZA BEFORE EVACUATION

Despite Rain of Shells, Sailors Burned Elevators at Port.

BAR TEUTONIC PASSAGE

Rumanians Blow Up Bridge Over Danube at Tchernavoda When Vacating.

LONDON, Oct. 26.—Everything in the port of Constanza that would have been useful to Field Marshal von Mackensen's forces was destroyed by Russian sailors before the port was evacuated, says a Reuter dispatch from Petrograd today.

"The last train left Constanza in the direction of Tchernavoda when the enemy was bombarding various sections of the line with the dispatch roads. The enemy concentrated a heavy, ceaseless gunfire on the port of Constanza, but the Russian sailors worked bravely under this fire, burning grain elevators, stores of cereals, flour, naphtha and kerosene. The Russian flotilla did not leave the bay until the port, with everything useful to the enemy, was in flames. The flotilla escaped unscathed."

BOOTY CLAIMS OF HUNS.

SOPIA, Oct. 25.—Via London, Oct. 26.—A large quantity of supplies was captured by the forces of Field Marshal von Mackensen at Constanza, the line of the dispatch roads.

"In Dobruja," the statement says, "the allied (Teutonic) troops are pursuing the enemy. On Tuesday evening they reached the line of Tschal-west of the village of Ester-Dorabanti, Tortoman, Movilla, Mosen, Oprea and the village of Kokurien. On Wednesday morning the first infantry division captured Tchernavoda. The pursuit continues."

"The booty captured at Constanza is considerable. It consists of 500 trucks, several locomotives, and other railway equipment, many oil tanks, most of which were full; sheds and storerooms, likewise full, and 70 Turkish vessels interned by the Rumanians."

"Along the Danube calm prevails." London, Oct. 26.—1:05 p.m.—A Rome dispatch to the Wireless Press says it is reported from Bucharest that after evacuation of Tchernavoda by the Russians and Rumanians the bridge over the Danube at that point was blown up by the Rumanians.

Norway's Loss in Shipping Is 268,000 Tons

Hundred and Forty-Nine Lives Are Taken by Sea Tragedies.

CHRISTIANIA, via London, Oct. 27.—The losses to the Norwegian shipping caused by the war have reached a total of 268,000 tons gross register, according to a compilation made by the Ritzau News Agency. The insurance carried amounted to 105,000,000 kroner, and the loss of life 149.

The Norwegian steamers Atle-Jarl, 1,084 tons, and Profit, 1,126 tons, have been taken to Swinemunde and Cuxhaven respectively by German warships.

Lloyds announces that the following vessels have been sunk. The Norwegian steamer Venus II, of 754 gross tons; the Danish steamer Ulff of 1,312 tons gross; the Belgian steamer Comtesse De Flandre, of 1,810 tons gross, and the British schooner Tweed of 200 tons gross.

The Norwegian steamer Sola has been sunk. The crew was landed.

The steamer Sola of 3,057 tons, sailed from New York October 3, for Havre. She was built at Sunderland in 1882.

KINCARDINE COLLECTS \$245. KINCARDINE, Oct. 26.—The last report of the Trafalgar Day collection for Kincardine shows a total of \$245.77 subscribed. There is still a small balance to come in, which will likely bring it up to the \$3,200 mark.

The ladies of the Red Cross Society here have a tea this week, the proceeds of which amounted to \$56.10. This will be used in local work.

The Red Cross Society of Kincardine held a shower of socks, goodies, etc., this week, to be sent to the boys of Kincardine now at the front, for Christmas. A great many splendid packages were handed in for the purpose.

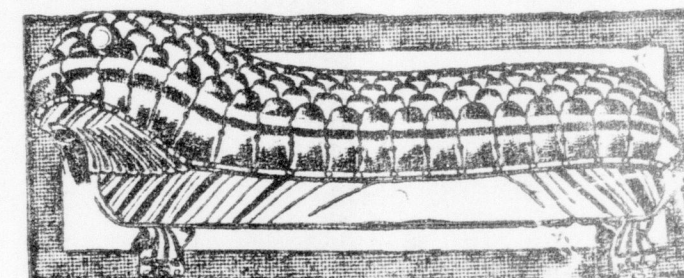
