

PROVINCIAL OFFICER TO EXPLAIN HOUSING FIGURES TO COUNCIL

Members of Housing Commission Will Be Invited To Meeting.

Because there is apparently a tangle between figures of the provincial housing department and those of City Clerk S. Baker regarding the amount of money involved in construction of dwellings here by the housing commission, a representative of the provincial body will be requested to address the city council at a future meeting and explain matters. J. A. Ellis in a communication read to members of No. 1 committee at Tuesday evening's meetings offered to take such action and his offer was accepted.

Despite the mix-up it is agreed by both City Clerk S. Baker and the provincial department that total expenditures of the housing commission here is \$683,868. To cover these loans the province advanced the city \$400,000 in 1919 under the provincial housing act, and the city council at its last meeting authorized debentures of \$100,000. This leaves \$383,868, for which the city council will likely be required to issue further debentures.

Housing Commission Invited.
Members of the housing commission will be requested to be present at the city council meeting, so that officials will know "how the situation stands." The city clerk stated that 175 houses, all told, had been constructed under the auspices of the local commission, and that payments due the Ontario Government for advances are "going back month by month."

A communication from the trades and labor council, urging that the Provincial Government acquire by purchase the St. Paul natural gas wells at Crumlin, was referred to the special gas committee of the city council and the local chamber of commerce.

Police To Co-operate.

Co-operation of the police with city firemen will likely be inaugurated on a definite system in the near future as the result of a recommendation to this effect passed by the committee to the police commission for action. Fire Chief Aitken reported that trouble has been experienced at fires here without police protection by curious crowds. He stated that the department will provide ropes with which to hold back crowds if police present can keep the people in safety zones. The committee favored his suggestion.

City Engineer H. A. Brazier reported that as the Standard Paving Company of Ottawa had "failed to keep its contract with the city, money was held back."

"It seems to me a pretty narrow piece of business," commented Ald. G. A. Wenig. "The engineer was away on a fishing trip when the company came to make repairs and they could not get any information."

Will Pay Account.

The committee ordered that the city engineer make minor repairs required by contract, and that cost of same be deducted from the amount due the Standard Paving Company. The balance owed by the city will then be paid to this firm.

Two applications from city youths, for free tuition at Western University, were recommended to the city council.

One of these was the first to come from a medical student, but the committee ruled that as the medical school is in same position as the arts college, and in view of the \$50,000 annual grant made by the city regarding free tuition to city students should apply to this case.

To Motorize Department.

Chairman F. R. Watkinson introduced the question of motorizing, outfitting city fire stations, but that cost of same be deducted from the amount due the Standard Paving Company. The balance owed by the city will then be paid to this firm.

Appointment of successors to Ald. John Bridge and Ald. J. Cameron Wilson, recently resigned from the London City Council, was laid over to a motion presented by the above two city fathers.

Sex Hygiene Added to the Curriculum to Supplement Health Courses.

Sex hygiene is one of the new subjects being added to the curriculum of the London Technical School. Lectures on this subject will be delivered to both boys and girls by local physicians who are co-operating with the staff of the school. The sexology will supplement the regular courses in health and hygiene, which are already being taught.

Principal Beal has announced that a new departure will be made this year by allowing a possible bonus of 100 marks, which will be available for promptness in attendance, marked interest in work, progress in games and sport, latent executive ability displayed, and general deportment.

According to Mr. Beal, very frequently the best pupils after graduation, lag behind those who secured far lower standing in examinations. The purpose of the new bonus is to make examination standings a surer indication of the success the students will secure after they leave the classroom and go out into the world.

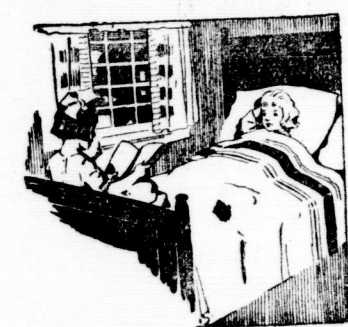

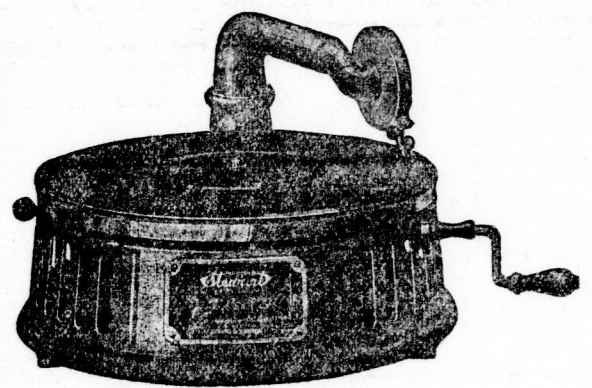

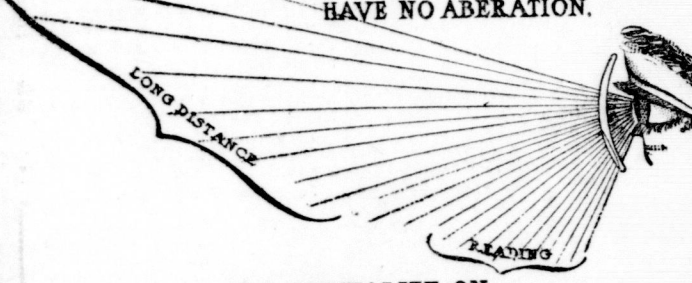

TEMPORARY APPOINTMENT AS COLLECTOR OF CUSTOMS

Official notification has been received from Ottawa that O. H. Talbot will succeed Charles H. Elliott as collector of customs in London. The appointment is temporary, and until it becomes permanent there will be no other changes or promotions, the new appointee advised The Advertiser today.

Commencing his duties in the customs service after completing his examinations in 1888, Mr. Talbot has since filled with complete satisfaction the positions of computing clerk, ledgerkeeper, cashier, surveyor, chief clerk, and inspector.

Hon. Freeman Talbot, a grand uncle of the new collector, was active in the early affairs of Canada, and assisted in the survey of the site of this city. Mr. Talbot's great-grandfather, Richard Talbot, in 1818, brought out a large party of settlers to locate in London Township.

OLD MEDICAL SCHOOL WILL OPEN OCT. 4 AS SCIENCE BUILDING

New equipment and furniture is being secured for the old Medical School, building at Waterloo and York streets, which on October 4 will be opened as the temporary science building of the Western University. Dr. R. C. Dearle is organizing an advanced class in physics, and among the subjects investigated by this class will be the Einstein theory of relativity as it relates to light. A great deal of new apparatus is being installed for the study of spectroscopy. One interesting measuring of has for its purpose the measuring of wave lengths. A wave length is one ten-thousandth of an inch in length.

Fully half of the chemistry work of the university will also be carried on in the old Medical School building and advanced classes will be organized by Dr. Sturdevant this year.

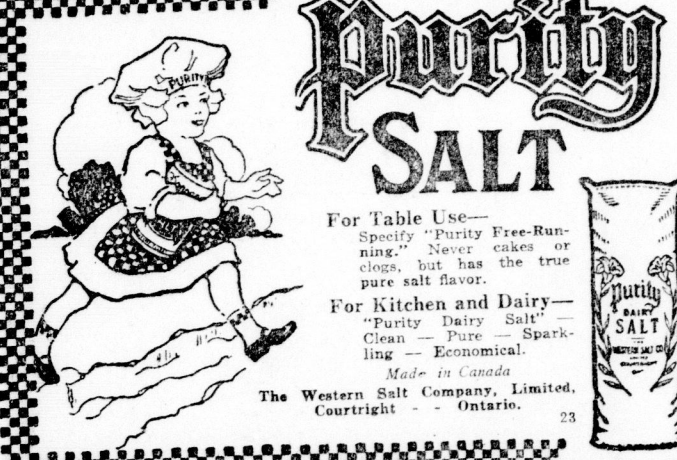
PRESBYTERIANS OF MARITIME AGAINST PROPOSED UNION

Halifax, Sept. 14.—Declaring that they regarded the proposed organic union of the Presbyterian Church of Canada with other denominations as "certain to produce widespread dissatisfaction, leading to the injury of the spiritual life, and ultimately to the disruption of the church," the maritime branch of the Presbyterian Association of Canada, formed here yesterday, passed the following resolution: "That this association affirm its determination to maintain and defend the Presbyterian Church in Canada; and further, that the association urges upon the Maritime Synod to overturn the general assembly that no further steps toward organic union be taken without a clear and unmistakable mandate expressed by a vote of the membership of the whole church."

The resolution will come before the Maritime Synod on Thursday afternoon.

DISPUTES GOVERNMENT'S RIGHT TO IMPOSE TAX

Victoria, Sept. 14.—Action has been instituted in exchequer court, asking for a declaration that the Dominion Government has no right to impose customs duties on liquor imported by the Provincial Government into British Columbia. Attorney-General Harris on the point involved comes under the British North America Act, which provides that no lands or property belonging to the government shall be taxed.

Calgary, Sept. 13.—The proceedings welcoming Rev. Robert Johnston, D.D., into the pastorate of Grace Presbyterian Church here, culminated last night in a reception in which all the clergy of the city participated. Rev. C. A.
