RETURNS PART OF INDEMNITY

Miss Agnes MacPhail Considers \$2,500 Sufficient Sessional Remuneration.

Regrets She Did Not Move To Decrease \$4,000 Allowance.

OTTAWA, June 29.—It was because long before she became a candidate in the last election she had denounced very strongly the increase in the sessional indemnity that Miss Agnes MacPhail today turned over \$1,440 of her sessional indemnity to Hon. W. S. Fielding, minister of finance. In effect, she was returning \$1,500, the \$60 being income tax on the amount.
"I am quite convinced that \$2,500 is not enough for a man who devoted himself to serving his country," Miss MacPhail explained. "What I did object to was the time when the indemnity was increased and the circumstances. Our men were overseas, and the great cry was economy."
"That was why I could not accept the \$4,000. If I had known the procedure in time I should have put forward my bill for a decrease in the indemnity. As it was, I saw it would never get through so I withdrew it rather than risk the remarks that I was playing to the gallery."
"I am glad that the \$1,500 is gone. I did not want to touch it."
"I have no condemnation for anyone else, but I do think there is no use of Sir Lomer Gouin or Mr. Fielding or Mr. Crerar, or any other man, not matter how great, preaching economy unless we can give the people a lead in economy and show the sincerity of the idea. Anybody can use \$4,000. A man with a family, away from home and business, probably needs it."
"But the sessional indemnity is not a salary; it is a mark of appreciation given by the country for service."
Miss MacPhail left this evening for her home at Fiesherston, Ont. She is booked to speak at meetings in her riding every day except Sunday until July 19. Afterwards, she says, she is going to disappear for a rest.

Right To Gates of Jail 2 Girls Went, Then They Did Repent.

FREDERICTON, N. B., June 29.—City Marshal John H. McCollum arrested two young women employed as clerks in an office on Queen street, this morning, and took them to the York County jail to commence terms of 24 and 29 days respectively for non-payment of civic taxes upon income.
About a dozen executions were covered this morning, and all the young women agreed to pay up without any demonstration, except the two referred to. They got as far as the jail door, but as it swung open one of the young women suddenly changed her mind. The other continued to show a stiff upper lip, and said she was prepared to go to jail "if the rest of the girls would refuse to pay, too." Finally, however, she decided it would be better to capitulate, and she agreed to pay also.

The "New North"

A Sportsman's Paradise.

To men who spend their vacation fishing, hunting or canoeing, Canada is first among the countries of the world for the opportunities it affords for indulgence in either of these invigorating and exciting pastimes.
But there is one part of the Dominion which is particularly inviting to the sporting fisherman, the big-game hunter or the canoeist. It is what is aptly termed Canada's "New North," reached via Cochrane, and comprehends that vast stretch of virgin country contiguous to the Canadian National Railways, transcontinental division, extending across the upper part of the provinces of Ontario and Quebec for a distance of over a thousand miles, with Hudson Bay as its northern limit. To quote a traveler who knows it well: "It is a virgin country just as God made it."

To the sportsman, this northern country is a veritable paradise. Within its vast forests there roam at will nearly all species of big game common to the North American continent. Of the big burly moose, it is the home. Red deer have a wide range, and in some sections are numerous, while caribou are to be had by the hunter who seeks them in their feeding grounds. In several districts bear are to be found, while the smaller fur-bearing animals are common to a wide range of territory.

Disciples of Isaac Walton will find in the numerous rivers and lakes all that the most ardent of them can desire, both in regard to extent and variety of fish which abound in their waters. Lake, or gray trout, ranging in weight from six to twenty pounds, are common to several of the lakes. Water in which speckled trout abound are easily accessible, although, naturally, the more remote the districts the better the sport. In some of the rivers and streams are to be caught speckled brook trout (known also as the square-tail trout, weighing from five to seven pounds. Good bass fishing is to be had in certain parts, and particularly in Northwestern Quebec. One species of fish, which is common to some of the older parts of Canada, not found in this far-northern country, is the maskinonge. But in some of the waters flowing into James Bay are to be caught the lordly sturgeon, sportsmen having landed fish of this species ranging in weight all the way from twenty to two hundred pounds. In the waters contiguous to Hudson Bay excellent salmon fishing is occasionally experienced. Pike and pickerel are common to the waters of this northern wild.

To the canoeist who seeks adventure in territory beyond the fringe of civilization, the waters of the northern parts of Quebec and Ontario afford ideal facilities. Rivers, many of them mighty streams, which for generations have served as highways to adventurers, fur traders and trappers, are almost beyond compute in number. The country being traversed by them. Wonderfully interesting canoe trips. Either extended or limited, are available. Take for example the six routes to Moose Factory, all of which find their way into Moose River about 30 miles south of Moose Factory on James Bay.

Until within recent years, this great new north was inaccessible to those who had but a few weeks' vacation at their disposal. It could not even be reached during an ordinary vacation term. Now, over the lines of the Canadian National Railways, the sporting fisherman, the hunter, the canoeist and holiday seekers in general, can occupying en route moderately appointed steel-constructed trains, reach points in this "happy hunting ground" in the course of a twenty-four-hour journey from such centers as Toronto and Montreal and from New York, Chicago and Boston in approximately thirty-six hours.
And there is an interesting little booklet entitled "Where to Hunt, Fish and Paddle in the New North," obtainable from any office of the Canadian National Railways, which enables the holiday seeker to select his camping ground in this primeval paradise.
A number of sectional maps covering the sporting territory from west of Lake Nipigon to Western Quebec, in which are shown canoe routes and trails, will prove invaluable to the sportsman visiting the territory. The booklet also furnishes information regarding guides, outfit and other necessary details.

ANGLICANS RAP MISSIONS PLAN

Circulate Petition Against Participation in Interdenominational School.

Declare May Schedule Contravenes Church's Original Claim To Existence.

TORONTO, June 29.—A protest against Anglican participation in the missionary educational scheme of the Canadian School of Missions has been circulated, and it is intended to present a petition to the house of bishops at their meeting in Toronto in September.
The petition sets out in part that this document in its acceptance of the ecumenical councils, that is to say, the decisions on matters of faith, morals and government set forth by the assemblies of all the bishops and lay representatives of the undivided church—accepts and indorses the action of the primitive and undivided church in her treatment of those who through pride, wilfulness, malice or ignorance held false doctrines within the body of Christ.

It also accepts the statements of the ecumenical councils that who hold such doctrines have thereby created division, have broken the unity of the body, and have destroyed their fellowship with that visible society known in history as the Catholic Church.
Make No Claims.
"There have grown up in the past four hundred years religious associations of Christian people each having a ministry and ordered corporate life of its own, but either making no claim to 'divinely ordered sacraments' through a ministry of Apostolic origin' or denying the possibility of such a claim; or repudiating it for their particular association."
"We your petitioners, in our acceptance of the solemn declaration, cannot but consider these associations as being separated from the visible society known in history as the Catholic Church, nor can we consider them to possess the same divinely ordered sacraments through a ministry of apostolic origin, and thus to be an integral portion of the church. Catholic in the manner that the claim is made for the Church of England in Canada in its solemn declaration. In making this statement your petitioners do not wish in any way to minimize the piety or good works of these religious bodies, as well individually, as corporately, but rather to emphasize the solemn statements, in the solemn declaration of general synod.

Oppose Co-operation.
"And whereas there seems to be a growing tendency in the Canadian church to unite a divinely ordered corporate life of that integral portion of the Catholic Church, with the corporate life of other religious bodies making no such claim, we, your petitioners, therefore deplore any policy of co-operation between the Church of England in Canada in her official and corporate capacity, and the aforesaid bodies which tends to obliterate or obscure this vital distinction."
"And whereas in the opinion of your petitioners, the school of missions is an example of this tendency, and its May schedule of lectures a contravention of its original claim for existence, and one which places the Canadian church in such a position as to stultify the statements of the solemn declaration.

"Your petitioners humbly pray that the house of bishops will take the necessary steps to compel the executive committee of the M. S. C. C. to withdraw the support of the Church of England in Canada from the Canadian School of Missions."

AWAIT REDUCTION IN FREIGHT RATES

Cut Due Saturday Unless Railway Commission Issues Further Order.

OTTAWA, June 29.—The coming into effect on July 1 of Crow's Nest rates on castbound wheat and flour will be preceded, it is expected, by a general order on freight rates, other than wheat and flour, by the railway commission.
The crux of the matter lies in the fact that a heavy decrease in freight rates generally is due to come into effect on Saturday next unless the railway commission issues a further order. This decrease, unless the commission otherwise determines, will be 25 per cent in eastern territory and 20 per cent in western. It represents the balance of the last big increase granted in September, 1920.
It is generally accepted here, although no official intimation is yet available, that an order will be issued by the railway commission on Friday either suspending the decrease or modifying it.

A general reduction of 10 per cent or so is suggested as a possible order of the coming order by the railway commission. On the other hand, the opinion is prevalent that Friday's order will not go so far as a 10 per cent reduction. The view even is taken in some quarters that present rates in some directions may be increased.
