Circulate Petition Against Participation in Interdenominational School.

Declare May Schedule Contravenes Church's Original Claim To Existence.

TORONTO, June 29.-A protest against Anglican participation in the missionary educational scheme of the Canadian School of Missions has been circulated, and it is intended to present a petition to the house of pishops at their meeting in Toronto in September

The petition sets out in part that this document in its acceptance of the ecumenical councils, that is to say, the decisions on matters of faith, morals and government set forth by the assemblies of all the bishops and lay representatives of the undivided church-accepts and indorses the action of the primitive and undivided church in her treatment of those who through pride, wilfulness, malice of ignorance held false doctrines within the body of Christ,





HAMILTON FIREMEN HURT MAKING RUN FOR MOVIES


Cameraman Cranks Away When Accident Occurs, Due to Break on Wagon. HAMILTON, June 29.-Two fire-
