

Manitoba Farmers Fear Frost As Only Agent That Can Affect Bumper Crop

FARMERS IN WEST FEAR FROST WAVE

Suspense Caused as Cold Spell Prevails Throughout Province of Manitoba.

SWEPT BY GALE

Canadian Press Despatch. Winnipeg, Aug. 15.—With Manitoba farmers waiting to harvest what agricultural experts regard as the best crop since 1915, the ensuing ten days will be fraught with much suspense, inasmuch as the cold wave which has prevailed throughout the province during the past week is lingering still, with light frosts forecast tonight.

The weather was moderately warm on Thursday morning, and took a disagreeable turn late in the afternoon, when a stiff gale swept over the province direct from the Hudson Bay region. It abated somewhat during the night, but gained force again this morning, although the lowest point registered was 44 degrees at The Pas.

While the cold wave is at present confined to Manitoba and parts of northeastern Saskatchewan, indications are that the unfavorable weather will become more general in Saskatchewan. In Alberta unsettled conditions prevail, with prospects of additional moisture during the week-end.

MEN TO DEMONSTRATE IN PROTEST OF SITUATION

Organization of Unemployed Elect Executive Consisting of Ten Members.

PETITION PREMIER

Layoff at Local C. N. R. Car Shops Strongly Disapproved by Members.

At a most enthusiastic meeting held in the Labor Temple last night under the auspices of the Labor Party, and with the president, Arthur Mould, in the chair, London's unemployed organized themselves by appointing an executive consisting of ten members, five from the Labor Party and five from the audience of over 100 unemployed men who were present.

The members of the newly elected executive are: Arthur Mould, John Ashton, 17 Kitchener avenue; Lawrence Menzies, 14 Hyde avenue; Gregory Arzuff, 79 Clarence street; J. F. Thomson, 222 Emery street; Frank Crookford, 104 Linwood street; W. J. Walker, 3344 Colborne street; Albert Heald, 265 Clarence street; Albert Kerton, 3 Grafton street; and John Wheatley, 229 Emery street.

A demonstration of the unemployed of the city is to be held this evening on the market square at 8 o'clock. Resolutions were unanimously adopted to the effect that Premier King and Sir Henry Thornton, as president of the C. N. R., be communicated with registering strong disapproval of the lay-off of 130 men at the local car shops, and also of the purchasing of machinery, etc., for the railway outside Canada. Premier King is also to be sent a resolution calling upon the Dominion government to provide "work or maintenance" for the unemployed of this and other cities of the country.

Mayor Wenlock, the aldermen of the council and representatives of the chamber of commerce are to be invited to attend a second meeting of the unemployed in the Labor Temple next Friday evening to discuss the question at greater length by way of placing the case of the unemployed before them, and particularly his worshipship, prior to his departure for an unemployment conference to be held at Ottawa early next month.

President Mould stated that there was no need whatsoever for any unemployment in Canada at the present time. He scored the workingman for "toeing the line on election day," whether it was for the municipal, provincial or federal offices, instead of standing behind the men of their own class, who knew labor conditions and were in a position to help the workingman.

William Tite charged that in the past both the Liberal and Conservative parties had failed miserably to do their duty by the working classes. He condemned the action of the Ontario government in sending the minister of mines to England to interest capital from that country for the development of silver mines in the province. Mr. Tite was in favor of the Dominion government spending money to relieve the unemployment situation rather than busing every immigrant who came into Canada to the extent of \$15. He declared that the failure of the governments of the country to enact laws for the stabilization of industry and finance was the direct cause of the unemployment situation. He inquired what the banks and the railroads were prepared to do for the unemployed, since they were both so strongly in favor of immigration.

Only One Solution. Frank Crookford affirmed that the only solution of the problem was "work or maintenance." He claimed that many of the working class would starve to death during the coming winter if nothing were done to relieve the situation.

L. R. Menzies counselled organization, and the first step thereafter was complete registration of every unemployed man in the city.

J. F. Thomson quoted M. M. McBride, M. L. A. for Brandon, as having said that should immigration not be prohibited to this country there would be revolution in Canada. Mr. Thomson expressed the belief

that force, not dynamite or bombs, but organization and grim determination, was the only way in which the government could be compelled to take some action in the matter. He asserted that the unemployed of this city had taken the situation during the past four years "lying down." He urged that instead they should show themselves as being in earnest by making it "damned inconvenient" for those who were the rulers in the city, province or Dominion. Mr. Thomson informed the audience that some five years ago he, together with Wm. Tite, had interviewed the then local representatives of parliament and the legislature, Hume Cronyn and Adam Beck, both of whom had been so sympathetic in the matter of unemployment insurance "that you would have thought we were going to have unemployment insurance next day; in fact they were so sympathetic that they did nothing and they have been doing it ever since that is something they always do well."

John Ashton gave it as his opinion that there are hundreds of men employed in the city at from \$12 to \$15 a week, barely a living wage. He also declared that there were over \$1,500,000 in the city at the present time. Mr. Ashton advised that the unemployed should organize themselves thoroughly, then march through the streets and hold open-air meetings by way of demonstrating to the public and the governments that they meant business.

PURSE PRESENTED MONS. P. McKEON

Former Rector of St. Peter's Cathedral Is Honored by Congregation.

In appreciation of his long and faithful service the congregation of St. Peter's Cathedral donated a purse of over \$1,000 and a very pleasing address to Right Rev. Monsignor P. J. McKeon, who is leaving the church to take charge of St. Martin's Parish in South London. The event took place in the auditorium of the Catholic Club on Richmond street.

In telling the congregation of St. Peter's that he was leaving the parish on Sunday, July 27, Monsignor McKeon expressed the desire that the church members would not go to the trouble and expense of delivering an address to him or of donating a gift of any kind. He stated that their co-operation and loyalty, shown in the past, was enough.

The members, however, took the case to heart. Mr. Fallon, and his parish took the stand that they would certainly be lacking in appreciation if they did not deliver an address and donate a gift to the departing pastor.

Accordingly, P. C. Flaherty, chairman for the occasion, in opening his remarks, told Mons. McKeon of these happenings so that he would not take the stand that they were acting directly against his expressed wishes.

Philip Pocock read the lengthy address and Martin O'Sullivan made the presentation.

Monsignor McKeon, in replying, reviewed the happy time he had experienced while rector of St. Peter's parish and expressed his thanks both for the co-operation given him and for the spirit of loyalty that was dominant throughout the membership during his ten years' service as pastor of the church.

Bishop Fallon made a few remarks, commenting on the spirit of loyalty already shown by the congregation, and added that the agreement between the pastor and the congregation was a wonderful thing to behold in any church.

NURSE DENIES REPORT OF TROUBLE AT BORDER

Miss L. D. Pearce Was Charged With Destroying U. S. Naturalization Papers.

Miss L. D. Pearce, a trained nurse of 312 Ottawa avenue, who has been charged in a newspaper report with tearing up United States naturalization papers when she was demanded to renounce allegiance to King George V., declared on her return from Buffalo, where she had been nursing, that she had at any time applied for naturalization papers and completely denied having torn up official papers of that nature.

Further, Miss Pearce advised that she has not been in Niagara Falls, N.Y., since last February, and that although she did at one time enter a registry office in Buffalo, she was not a participant in any "scrap of paper" affair. The first knowledge Miss Pearce had of the episode was through the newspaper.

"Nothing could be farther from my intentions," she declared, "to insult in such a manner the country that has been so kind to me at any time. Furthermore, I might add that I have never had any trouble whatsoever with the immigration authorities in trips across the border."

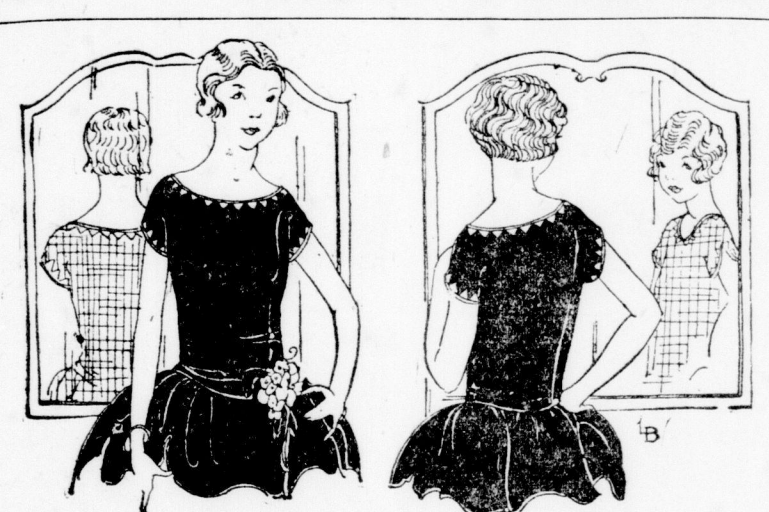

Killed In Fall After Failure To Find People

Toledo, O., Aug. 15.—Margaret Taylor, 16, of North Chicago, fell 75 feet to her death today, when the rope, improvised from bed sheets, by which she was trying to make her escape from the fifth floor of the juvenile home, broke and dashed her to the stone pavement below. She died on her way to the hospital.

The girl was not under arrest. Officials are unable to understand the reason for her attempt to escape. Juvenile authorities took her into custody when she reported that she was stranded here without baggage.

The girl told officials she was trying to earn money to remove her mother's body from Potter's field in Chicago. Last week she tried, but failed to locate relatives in Windsor, Ont.

MAN DIES AT SARNIA WHEN HIT BY ENGINE

Shunting in C. N. R. Yards, Engine Crushes David Lake, Who Dies Later.

Special to The Advertiser. Sarnia, Aug. 15.—David Lake, 50, a Finlander, died in Sarnia General Hospital this morning shortly after being struck by a shunting engine in the C. N. R. yards here. Lake, whose home is located to be in Toronto, was employed with a crew in building new tracks, and his accident was not observed. It is believed the foot-board of the engine struck him, knocking him down and badly crushing him. Both shoulder blades, the spinal column and several ribs were broken. An inquest has been ordered.

AMENDMENTS TO GOVT OF INDIA ACT OPPOSED
