**UNIVERSITY CLUB
HOLDS ITS THIRD
ANNUAL DINNER**Professor James Mavor of To-
ronto Gives Address On
Economies.**EVENT MARKS GROWTH**

The third annual dinner of the History and Political Science Club of the University of Western Ontario was held at the Blue Dragon Tea Rooms last night. The event proved the marked growth and success of the club since its inception three years ago, and reviewed not only the work and ideals of Western's foremost club, but expressed the high attainments reached by the University and the recognition that had come to the college from many sources both at home and abroad.

James Mavor, Ph.D., Professor Emeritus of the University of Toronto, department of political economy, was the special guest and speaker. Professor Mavor outlined a program for dealing with the subject of economics beginning in the elementary stage, and also spoke of his journeyings in Russia.

In speaking of the treatment of political economy where the beginning of a study is to be made, Prof. Mavor emphasized that since the subject of economics deals primarily with man, and since there is hardly anything dealing with man that it outside the realm of economics, the student might best begin his studies in his home town. The study, continued the speaker, should be started with facts already known, and to be scientifically carried out, a study should be made of one's own surroundings.

Professor Mavor strongly advocated the collection of data on the subject as being of great importance, and also urged that the student refer to the old masters for guidance and material help. The suggestion was made that a good start could be made with a translation of Pliny. This could well be followed by the English classics and the great masterpieces of literature.

"The fact that a book is old should by no means put it aside," said the speaker, who added that while many standard works on commerce were written before the modern development of trade as we know it, they were by no means written before commerce had been highly developed. Referring to Adam Smith's "Wealth of Nations," Prof. Mavor showed that while that classic was written before the invention of the steam engine, that is, before the development of modern industry, it yet treats of broad principles on a sound basis.

Touching on the topic of war, the speaker, who added that while many standard works on commerce were written before the modern development of trade as we know it, they were by no means written before commerce had been highly developed.

speaker felt that while all wars must be the result of a mistake, perhaps due to a political plunder or a diplomatic mystery as an immediate act of causing war, yet war must be considered with regard to influence on European politics, of increased European populations and increased costs of living.

Prof. Mavor then reviewed living conditions in Russia, Austria, Galicia, stating that the populations of those countries had increased enormously. He pictured a street scene in a village in Poland where in a building occupying a frontage of 21 feet there were seven shops where the seven proprietors not only conducted their various businesses, but lived as well, such were the living conditions in the congested European countries.

Professor Mavor then told of his sojourn in Russia, of the kindly and hospitable treatment that he received at the hands of the lowliest peasant folk, of how the laborers lived a community life and how they sang at their work.

Regarding the methods of farming the speaker declared that they were most incompetent, especially when working for themselves. On some of the large well-managed estates the work on the land was done well, but the peasant farmer did not manage very well.

In conclusion Professor Mavor hoped that honest men in Russia might form an honest nucleus out of which some might come.

MADE AT C. P. R.**Freight Car Entered and Four
Cases Are Seized by
Officers.

One of the biggest liquor hauls made in London for some time and valued at thousands of dollars was made yesterday afternoon at the C. P. R. freight sheds, when license Inspector Walter Bolton, in company with Provincial Constable T. Y. Stratton, entered a freight car and seized four large packing cases.

Labelled electric fixtures, the cases revealed, upon investigation, bottled liquor that, at the present bootleggers' price, would be worth, at least \$4,500, it being estimated that the cases contain 450 bottles or more. The car containing the liquor had only arrived earlier in the day.

While the cases bear the name of a man supposed to live in London, License Inspector Bolton declared that in all probability the name is fictitious, and whoever the consignment was meant for will see his cargo sent to the dispensary in Toronto, rather than come forward and claim it.

The officers are inclined to believe that a big bootleg ring, with headquarters in London, might know something of the supposed electric fixtures. A determined effort will be made, however, to locate the owner of the liquor.
