Hon. Mr. Perley Discusses the Future of the Dominion.

fown Lots In Outside Subdivisions and Uncertain Oil Shares Are Pure Speculation, and Their Failure Should Not Be Blamed on Canada, Declares Minister at London Dominion Day Banquet.

LONDON, July 2.—(C.A.P. Cable.)
—Dominion Day was generally celebrated by the Canadian colony here. Hon. G. Hr. and Mrs. Perley gave a reception in the afternoon. The customary dinner in the evening was attended by about 500 guests. Mr. Perley presided and the principal guests were: Prince Alexander of Teck, Colonial Secretary Harcourt, Henri Bourassa, Sir Thomas Skinner, Lord Emmett and John Sannield, M.P.

Messages of greeting were read from Premier Sir Robert Borden and Sir Charles Tupper.

Mr. Perley, in proposing the toast of the "Dominion,", opened his remarks with a graceful reference to the late Lord Strathcona and passed on to review the general conditions in Canada. He claimed that the Dominion had passed through the period of depression as well as any other part of the world. He added:

"I stand up for Canadian business honesty and probity as being as great as anywhere in the world, but at the same time the layestor, should exercise his usual wise care and caution LONDON, July 2.—(C.A.P. Cable.)
