LOCAL INTELLIGENCE.

Wednesday, January 25. THE ELIZABETH KIMBALL .- This ship still remains on the rocks at Trial Island, in the same state as reported yesterday. This morning, however, energetic efforts will be made to relieve her from her perilous posis tion, Mesers. Edgar & Aime, of Victoria, agents for her owners, having engaged the steamer Thames to tug her off the rocks, and bring her into port. The Thames went out to the spot last night, and this morning. about four c'elock, when the flood tide is at the highest, an attempt was to be made to haul the ship off, her ballast having been previously shifted aft, and every means used to assist the operation. If successful, the ship will then be towed across to Port Gamble, should it be found that she can be kept afloat for that distance, and if not, she will be taken into Esquimalt, and beached till assistance can be precured from the other side. A special message will be sent to Port Gamble to-day, by her agents here, with an order for the company's new and powerful steaming Cyrus Walker, to come to the Kimball's assistance. The steamer Thames is meanwhile engaged by the day to do all that can be done for the safety of the ship. We understand that she is valued at from \$40,000 to \$50,000, and that she is not insured, it being the custom of Messrs. Pope and Talbot to underwrite their own

SUPREME COURT .- H. N. Steele v. H. M. Cohen .- This was a special jury case. Plaintiff sued defendant for \$800 and interest thereon from December 10th, 1862, alleged to be due upon a certain promissory note drawn by defendant to the order of plaintiff and discounted at Macdonald's bank. Mr. Green, appeared for the plaintiff, and Mr. Carey, instructed by Mr. Drake, for defendant. The defence was that the note was signed by the defendant for the accommodation of the plaintiff without valuable consideration. The parties to the suit, together with several witnesses, were examined and the books of Macdonald's bank were put in evidence, The counsel on both sides having been heard, his Honor summed up and instructed the jury to weigh the evidence of the plaintiff and defendant and decide whether they found the defendant's liability established on the face of the written document. The jury returned a verdiet for the plaintiff for the principal, but as so long a time had been allowed to elapse before the claim had been enforced they did not allow the interest claimed.

NANAIMO.-The steamer Fideliter, Capt Loudon, arrived last night from Nanaimo and the settlements, with a few passengers, amongst whom were Capt. Nicols and Mr. Franklyn, J. P., of Nanaimo. There is nothing new from above. The schooner was the only vessel at Nanaimo. All small boats are frozen in, with ice 11/4 inches thick. The Fideliter had to cut through a good deal of ice in making her way She returns this morning at eight o'clock, and will leave Nanaimo for New Westminster to-morrow with the mails.

MARTIN'S CASE .- The charge of embezzlement against Martin was resumed yesterday morning and again adjourned, to enable the accused to bring evidence of his being a commission agent, and also of tender of balance due. Mr. Dennes applied, as the case had assumed so different an aspect, that his client might be released on his own recognizance, which was assented to by the Court.

ICE IN THE FRASER-The present sharp cold snap, it is thought, will again interfere with the navigation of the Fraser. When the Enterprise was up at Langley last week she had to cut her way through ice, and a large cake was then forming as low down as the Camp. The next trip of the Enterprise will probably be to Burrard's Inlet on Wed.

THE TELEGRAPH-The Attorney General has introduced a bill into the Legislative Council to amend the former Telegraph bill passed by the Legislature. The purport of the amendments is to do away with the monopoly granted by the original bill to the company as contrary, to English law.

Friday, January 27. THE ELIZABETH KIMBALL.—This unfortu nate ship was hauled off from her uncomfortable berth on Trial Island rocks by the steamer Thames yesterday morning at 9 o'clock, and is now on her way to Port Gamble. About 8 o'clock the Thames was anchored a short distance to windward of the ship, and several lines were run out and made fast to her. The Thames then put on steam, and after a steady pull the Kimball yielded and slid quietly off the rocks on to deep water. She was then towed about half a mile out into the Straits, when finding that he could keep her free from water, the captain, Greenleaf, dismissed the tug and set all sail, with a fair wind, for Port Gamble. The Thames acted her part nobly in the under-taking, and Capt. Henderson deserves praise for the way in which he managed the operation. Too much credit cannot be awarded to Mr. D. A. Edgar, of this city, for his conduct in the affair. To his judgment and energy the owners of the ship are without doubt in-debted for her rescue from almost certain destruction. She was a hore on probably the worst spot on the whole inside coast, and had a conth-east gale come on, nothing could have prevented her from going to pieces.

SUPREME COURT. - Acting Attorney-Genera . G. H. Cary. This case was heard yesterday before His Honor the Chief Justice, and ommon Jury. The Acting Attorney-General, instructed by Messrs. Pearkes & Green, appeared on behalf of the Government, and Mr. Cary in person. The action was brought to recover \$526 and interest, being the amount of fees alleged to have been collected by the defendant while Registrar of Joint Stock Companies, on behalf of the Colonial Government. SUPREME COURT - Gastineau vs. Copland-This was an action of trover, damages laid at \$500, in which the plaintiff sued the defendant for the unlawful detention and converting to his own use of a certain map of the Ross Estate prepared by the plaintiff who alleged that he was prevented from recovering the amount due to him for the survey and for making reduced copies of said plan. Mr. McCreight instructed by Messrs. Pearkes & Green appeared for the plaintiff, and Mr. Ring, instructed by Mr. Courtney for the defendant. The defence set up was that an action for trover could not be inasmuch as the plan was received from Mr. Drake and McCreight, instructed by Messrs. Pearkes & not from the plaintiff. The case excited much interest amongst the professional gentlemen. A number of witnesses were examined on both sides, and the jury returned a verdict for the plaintiff for \$300. Mr. Ring, we understand, was instructed to apply for a new trial before a Special Jury.

> RICH GOLD DIGGINGS IN SOUTH AMBRICA. By the Brazilian mail, which reached Southampton on the 3d December, intelligence was received from Buenos Ayres of the discovery of gold in large quantities in San Juan, at the foot of the Cordillera Mountains. Over 500 ounces were obtained in nuggets in one day by two miners. San Juan city and district are situated in the Argentine Republic, and it was there that Mr. J. M. Tierney, formerly editor of the Coloniar, was residing when last heard from.
