Ottawa, March 25.—In the common

March 27," was read by the premier:

"The party under my command have just

arrived. When we were at Fort Carleton

we had a large quantity of supplies there.

They were not by some hundreds of

and civilians. The rebels fired first when

the firing became general. Major Crozier,

owing to the disadvantage at which he

was taken retreated in good order, ar-

riving at the fort some time since my

party. Ten civilians of Prince Albert and two

police men were killed and 41 civilians and

7 constables wounded. The number of

rebels killed is not known. The police

and civilians acted with the greatest brav-

ery under a heavy fire. The killed are:

and Alex. Stewart. Northwest Mounted

Police—Inspector J. Howe, Corporal Gil-
