Mr. Campbell discovered the blaze on returning from dinner, and Mr. Maclure sent in the alarm and conducted the firemen to the exact spot, so that no time was lost in getting down to work.

Owing to the exclusive use of the chemical, the damage done outside of the goods actually burned was merely nominal. The stock is of such a nature that an immediate estimate of the amount of damages is of doubtful value, but it is placed at from \$2,000 to \$3,000, which amount is fully covered by insurance in several companies.


