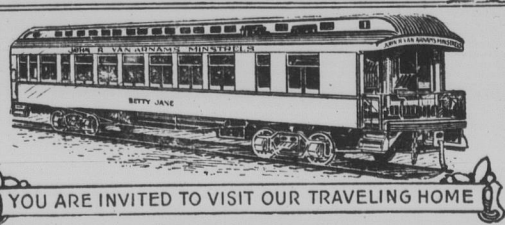
ELECTION RETURNS

have been out for eight years now and are cold and hungry and want in."

That Mr. Stewart's memory is failing for in discoursing on the extravagances of the Government he forgot to tell us how much it cost when he was in the Government to paint the railing of the old, tumble down bridge over Walker Pond just below Campbellton. If that payment was considered all right, why worry over some little expenditure of the present Government.

That Mr. LaBilloy is going to secure one vote surely, as he threw out a nice bid for the support of Mr. Stewart when he told the people that if he (LaBilloy) were elected, he would vote to secure the portfolio of Minister of Public Works for Mr. Stewart. It is surely plain that Mr. LaBilloy's sympathy is with the Stewart party.

That Mr. LaBilloy is living in the remote past and he enjoys telling the people how he was appreciating the worthies of long, long ago, Hon. A. G. Blair and others—but fails to explain that although willing, oh so willing to take upon himself the responsibilities of a representative of the county, he has always failed to get the nomination and although not asked to "come out" has again and again thrust himself on the people, to the embarrassment of what he calls "his own party."

That eventually Mr. Stewart aspires to a Cabinet position. What should we call that aspiration? Ambition—Well, hardly. The little dog who had a nice bone in his mouth and, crossing a brook, saw the reflection as he thought of another dog with another bone, snapped greedily at the second bone. Alas! Mr. Stewart. We are afraid that neither circumstances, grace nor ability ever intended that you should hold a Cabinet position.

That if a Cabinet Minister should be found resident in Restigouche Co. and of Opposition leanings, the electorate should pray that the position would not carry with it the right to expend large sums of money. Memory seems to suggest that the little purchasing done by Mr. Stewart in a Government capacity was done from his own brother-in-law and at lovely prices.

That Diette assumes no responsibility. Laughs and jokes about the whole matter and the only serious thing about the whole matter of the candidacy of the immortal Henry is that his position at Fredericton during the last four years cost the rate-payers of the Province \$1,000 each year. But Henry saved \$999 of it. So that's that.

That friends of prohibition who are in a condition of dissatisfaction with the Government can, unfortunately, find no ray of hope in the attitude of the Opposition. The platform utterance of the Opposition Monday contained not one word of what they will do for the cause of Temperance. We only know that the leader of the Opposition is a determined enemy of a Prohibition law—that he has not one real, at the heart, prohibition follower in his Cabinet slate.

That in the ranks of the Government party are found the most sincere friends of moral reform and if backed up by a united people at this election, will do for us an exceeding good work along the lines of prohibition—Mothers' Allowances, Prevention of Disease and care for babies of poor people.

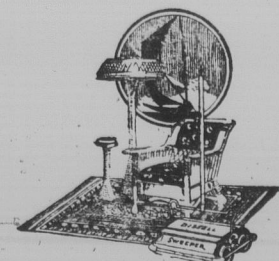
