THE PUIUSE OF BAILWAY MONOPOLIES IN

The question of provincial rights assum a practically important aspect when we consider the necessity of legislating so as to give the state some power of controlling freight rates and other charges by which the two gigantic railway monopolies may intend to increase their dividends at the expense of the people. Even already by the action of the United States trunk lines in the matter of the freight-handlers, business in Ontario has suffered. One prominent publisher in this city has his press stopped for weeks because he cannot get freight on from New York. The only remedy in Canada for a future of autocracy is either a legislation as to freight of the control of the entire railway system. That is liable to the objection that it would vastly increase the opportunities for political corruption, the answer to which is that there could not be more than at present with the railway always ready to bid for government support. But stringent legislation on the subject of freights may be obtained when our parliamentary functions whose votes are controlled by a few wirepullers whom the railways can always influence. This question is one which interests every merchant and farmer in the country it will make itself felt more and

Even at Alexandria the Egyptians fought bravely and made the best effort possible to maintain an untenable position. In the desert, which is the real base of Arabi's operations, the conditions are all in his favor. And he will be backed by immense hosts of Bedouin horsemen, whose Arab steeds are accustomed to desert warfare, while the riders can carry their own commissariat in the shape of a few

The situation does not seem improved by the fact that contrary to the confiden anticipations of the Gladstone government, England appears to be isolated in European diplomacy. Germany has in direct terms declined to sanction the bombardment. France so far has stood coldly aloof. Austria's still doubtful co-operation is of little value with Germany to check her on one side and Russia on the other. The atrocities committed by the Egyptians at Alexandria ought to interest the conference of the powers in uniting to restore some sort of order, but it is doubtful how far jealousy of England will sanction further res of aggression. No one can tell a week before hand in what direction the diplomatic wind may blow.

SPELLING REFORM.

The reform of the spelling of the English language is nearer at hand than some people imagine. Everyone admits that the present mode is arbitrary in the extreme and militates against the acquirement of English by foreigners and wastes the time of English speaking children in trying to master its vagaries. The great majority of Herald stamp. philogists have pronounced in favor of the re-organization of the alphabet and of spelling phonetically. The opinions thus held by these reformers are gradually spreading among the body of the people and now spelling reform associations are becoming quite common in both America and England. The reform is bound to come ; what is most wanted is that the change shall be intelligently brought about and that can best be secured by some understanding between the leading English shilologists and grammarians in America and in the old country.
