The pores of smut will live a long ime in the ground or in manure, and every care should be taken to destroy them. Cut out every diseased stalk before it has time to ripen, and resow itself. One preventive is to select the seed before husking time; taken from the crib it will very likely have come in contact with infected corn.

Why not make a record of when each vegetable was planted, leaving a space beside it for the date when you began to use it and how long it lasted. Such a record will be a very valuable guide for next year and will do more than aught else to show you the need for a succession in the garden.


