

The Price of Oleomargarine

The price of butter is said to be taken as a basis for regulating the price of oleomargarine. Throughout the country "Oleo" is ranging in price from 34 to 38 cents, with butter hovering around the fifty-cent mark. Some people have been finding fault with the price of oleomargarine, but others are glad of the opportunity to obtain a first-class product somuch below the prevailing price of butter. butter.

The demand both in Watford and elsewhere is an indication that people are accepting the butter substitute very cheerfully. Whether its use will become sufficiently general to bring down the price of butter remains to be seen. Many of those who have been experimenting with oleomargarine pronounce it very satisfactory and consider it household economy to use it in preference to butter. The prejudice that many entertained is gradually vanishing and it is believed that within a comparatively short time a large Canadian demand will have been created for oleomargarine.
