We have much pleasure in publishing the ' Report of the Sumoan missionarics, Messis Murray and Sunderand, who lately visited Aneiteum, and are thats enabled 'to (leolare' unto us 'that which they have seen and heard.' While there is no reason to think that any of our rearlers viewed with mistrust the intelligence which has come dircetly from the hands of our missionaries, it is nevertheloss excedingly gratifying to recei e the corroborative testimony of the accredited deputies Tof the London Missionary Suciety, who, from their peri mal experience in a neighboring 'held, are peculiarly qualified to judge of the results which have attended the labors of Mr Geddic. The fact appease now to he beyond question, that no mission ffield in modern times appears to be so productive as it the Polynesian has been; and of the various groups of islands dotting the southern Pacific, the New Hebrites would appear nor ito be the most inviting for missionary enterprise. When we consider the isolated nature of the field, the debased and debasing superstitions of the antive heathenism, the virulence and obstinacy of the epposition rhich has been maintained by European agency for the vilest purposes, and the very limited amount - I mission labor expended, we may readily concede that the success which has follored the effurts of our church in Aneiteum has been not only highly
encourrfering, but such as no other church, in the mregent day, has been privileged to enjoy.

The accompanying letter of Dr Tidman will reassu. . our friends of the deep interest which is felt in our prosperity by that society which of all others can most effectually aid and encourage us. The complaint preterct against Dr Ross for negligence in furwarling supplies will soon be adjusted. Indecd, we question very much whether Dr I. would have been justified in allowing the boxes of clothing, \&c., to pass from his charge into the hands of the mate or master of a whaler, who had no apthority from Mr Gedulie or any one else to recelve them. The f.tult appears rather to be in allowing the John Williams to leave Sydncy on her first trip to the islands without any supplies for Inciteum, cither from England or Nora Scotia. It is matter of great comfort that the circumstances of our mission family are too well buewa, commercial intercourse too frequent, and the meaus of aubsistence obtained from the soil too abundant, to admit of such a revolting spectacle as that which the I'itagonian mission presented so recently to the puinful contemplation of the Christian forld.
