In every single congregation, there fore, there should be a plurality of elders, composed of one, at least, who is pastor, and also, associated with him, are ruling elders who join in government. This plurality of elders in a single congregation is called the congregational presbytery—otherwise called the Session. It is the duty of the Session to promote, in every Scriptural way, the spiritual interests of the flock under its charge, both young and old watching over he life and conduct of the members, and seeing that Christian ordinances are administred. In every single congregation there should 'also be the Diaconate—deacons, or boards of management—elected by the people, who are specially intrusted with the management of temporal affairs and the outward business of the House of God.
