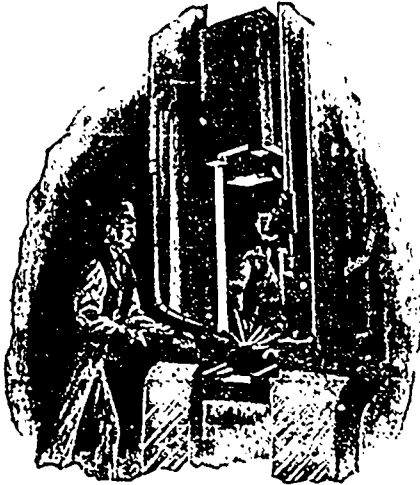


Scientific Forging and High Grade Bicycles.
