TALKING 800 MILES.

SUCCESSFUL TEST OF TELEPHONING FROM

BUFFALO TO BOSTON AND NEW YORK, The Buffalo Evening News reports that the new long distance telephone, which is soon to be put into operation there, was tested by the officers and directors of the Bell Telephone Company on the 14th inst. The connections had been put at 5 p. m. and communication was at once opened between Boston, Springfield, New York, Troy and Buffalo.
