UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE QUESTIONNAIRE FOR EARLY RETIREES

Mr. Jean-Claude Malépart (Montreal—Sainte-Marie): Mr. Speaker, while the scandals of Quebec Conservative Members are front-page news throughout the country, while these people get together only to try to define a strategy to improve their image instead of putting an end to these scandals, other Members in the Opposition deal with the day-to-day affairs which are of concern to all Canadians, and I am referring specifically to the 35,000 early retirees in this country. This is just another scandal which has prompted the Minister of Employment and Immigration (Mr. Bouchard) to raise the possibility of a repayment.

NATIONAL PARKS

PROPOSED SOUTH MORESBY NATIONAL PARK

Mr. Jim Fulton (Skeena): Mr. Speaker, the federal Government and the Province of B.C. are locked in a struggle over the boundaries for a national land and marine park in the South Moresby area of the Queen Charlotte Islands. The original owners and occupants of the area, the Haida people, last week adopted a constitution and sovereignty on the Queen Charlottes known to them as Haida Gwaii. They have tried in every way to accommodate the setting aside of South Moresby as a national park. At issue is continued logging on Lyell Island, in particular in the Windy Bay watershed.

In three consecutive federal elections all three federal Parties have endorsed the designation of South Moresby as a national park. The spokespersons on environment for all three federal Parties in this House endorse the inclusion of Lyell Island in the park proposal. Now is the time for Canada's Prime Minister (Mr. Mulroney) to speak out and put forward the few dollars necessary to secure this area for all future generations to share. The will of the Haida people, the will of this House, and the aspirations of the future must be met.

I know you, Mr. Speaker, endorse South Moresby with the inclusion of Lyell Island. I hope the Prime Minister is listening and supports his own Minister of the Environment (Mr. McMillan) in this sacred undertaking.
