

## VETERAN PLAYER BEATEN BY OTTAWA YOUNGSTER

## OTTAWA YOUTH SURPRISES THE TALENT, PUTTING AWAY REITH

Norman Scott Disposes of Montreal Crack in Extra Hole and Another Local Opponent in Afternoon—His Long Driving the Feature.

The second day's play in the Canadian amateur golf tournament at the Toronto Golf Club provided more surprises than one usually sees in several months. With the enforced absence of the champion, George Lyon, thru illness, came the younger contestants and runners-up of former years in all their array to wrestle for the honor. All the way the play was spirited and record-breaking and every one seemed inoculated with new life in his attempt at downing his opponent.

The scores even on the greatly lengthened course were even better than the opening day and the few veterans who survived the torrent were forced to give the records some awful scares. The biggest surprise of the day was the defeat of T. B. Reith of Montreal, the noted Scottish player, by a newcomer and as yet but a youth, Norman Scott of Ottawa, who also eliminated in the afternoon Julian Sale, Jr., of Rosedale, the winner of the championship match.

Scott uncovered some wicked driving that startled the critics and his accuracy was astounding. The match went to the nineteenth hole, which Scott won, aided by a drive that reached the edge of the green after both players turned in cards of 77 each. Another match that went extra holes, was the one which R. F. MacDonald of Hamilton, won from J. W. Yule, Montreal. Dr. Novinger, Outremont, did the remarkable feat of being downy three and then coming back and taking the match at the twentieth hole from H. M. Gray, Jr., of Rosedale. E. E. L. Henry Anderson, Montreal, nearly accomplished the same feat, but was out-lucked by A. Wright, Toronto. The third round was four down and five to go, but secured the next four holes to some phenomenal golf and had the match evened up at the seventeenth, only to lose his ball and the match at the last.

In the second round, more Toronto who had so successfully disposed of his club mate, R. C. H. Cassels, in the morning, was forced to acknowledge A. Adams, Hamilton, as the victor, who was playing wonderful golf, by the score of 4 up and 2. C. Stephens, Montreal, after a ding-dong battle with W. M. Griffith, Lambton, in which neither player was more than one up all the way around, was leading by one up and one to go at the eighteenth and on reaching the green had the odds in his favor. He dropped a 40-foot putt and secured the half and grabbed the match. ## ARGONAUTS TO ROW ATHENLEY TODAY

England's Big Rowing Classic Gets Under Way—Toronto Crew Well Thought of.

HENLEY, England, July 2.—The Henley Royal Regatta, England's annual water carnival, which opened today in beautiful weather, is even of greater international interest than heretofore. Of the 69 entries, 11 are from outside the United Kingdom, including those of the Argonaut Rowing Club of Toronto for the Grand Challenge Cup, the race for crews of eight, which is looked on as the big event in the rowing world. Last year the cup was won by Australia, but they have since defended the title this year, and it is to go out of the United Kingdom, it must be taken by Canada. The Argonauts have made four previous attempts to win the coveted trophy, the last in 1912. Against the Canadian crew will be the best that England can produce. Jesus College, Cambridge; New College, Oxford; the Leander, Thames and London Rowing Clubs have all entered crews, and, as usual, when England's supremacy in this race is seriously challenged, Leander is depended upon to defend it. That club this year has a crew made up of Oxford and Cambridge men, with T. E. Tower of Trinity as stroke.

The Berlin Rowing Club also has a pair in the race for the Silver Goblet, and Nickall's Challenge Cup, and here they will have to row against four university pairs.

The race for the Diamond Challenge Sculls has brought out ten scullers, whereof three are from the United Kingdom, viz.: E. B. Butler of the Argonauts of Toronto, H. M. Kusik of the St. Petersburg Rowing Club, and C. McVilly of the Tasmania Rowing Club. The Tasmanian is regarded as having a very good chance, although he has to prove his superiority over several English scullers.

## GETAWAY DAY AT HAMILTON FINDS SOME STIRRING FINISHES

Favorites and Outsiders Divide the Card—Vandergriff Beats Southern Maid—Micosukee Wins at Long Odds.

The Hamilton Jockey Club's first meeting of the year came to a close yesterday, and it was pronounced by horsemen and spectators to have been the best meeting ever held in Hamilton.

When First Sight, from the Davies stable, cut across his field too sharply during the recent O.J.C. meeting at the Woodbine, the horse was disqualified, and quite properly, but the same rule should apply to a case where the local owner would be benefited as to where he was the sufferer by the ruling.
