"What do I think of Canada?" said Commissioner Richards yesterday afternoon in the Salvation Army Temple. "What do I think of a country that I have seen so far only through a window? I am afraid I could not do justice to it. Since arriving at Vancouver it has rained incessantly and I have seen some things which have made a great impression on me. I think that kind of rain while traveling through from my experience tells me that all kinds of minerals lie hidden beneath it, and I saw a country which has great opportunities for agriculture. That is the great industry which will make this country, and the great rolling prairies of yours are going to yield up golden sheaves. I predict that this country will be the center of the empire before many years and that civilizations will turn their eyes towards Canada."
