Ottawa Board Attacks Action of Government at Osgoode Hall.

INJUNCTIONS SOUGHT

Court Adjourns Three Motions Until Trial Comes On.

On behalf of the old separate school board and its chairman an application was made to Mr. Justice Clute at Osgoode Hall yesterday, for three orders, two to restrain the City of Ottawa and the Bank of Quebec from dealing with assets or paying out money from separate school funds and the third to compel the secretary-treasurer of the old body to call a meeting of that

He said that it was not a bilingual question before the court, but whether turning to the lake for tea. BRILLIANT FRENCH SUCCESS IN VOSGES

an Hour Sufficed to Drive the Foe From Position.

PERSISTENT **ENEMY**

But All Attempts to Regain Fontenelle Heights Failed.

PARIS, Aug. 5.—An official eyewitness' account of a French success at Ban-de Sapt, in the Vosger Mountains, was made public today by the

French War Department: "On July 16," the eye-witness says, the Germans directed four heavy counter-attacks with two battalions on the heights of Fontenelle, recently captured by us, which were complete-

checked.
"July 24 and 25 a French attack with equal forces took all the enemy's works to the west of Launois, includ-ing several houses in the village, killng or capturing the entire German garrison and occupying the positions.

Foe's Strong Attack.

The eye-witness continues attack on Fontenelles, which was pre-pared with an extended bombardment with guns of all calibres, saying: "The gun fire of the Germans was directed against four points simultaneously, their principal attack being made on our strong positions across the road from Laitre to

"The enemy then charged, being sheltered by the fire from his heavy artillery. Despite this fire our quick firers, which were mounted on the parapets of the trenches, mowed down the advancing line, while our artillery directed a wall of fire in the rear of the Germans, thus effectively pre-venting any reinforcements coming to

their support.
"The advancing line was seen to waver, to break, and fall back. During the night the battle was continued by the aid of sarchlights. "At daybreak the side of Hill 597 was seen to be strewn with bodies. Our losses were four killed and 35 French Success.

A French attack on July 24 was directed against height 627, and a group of houses forming a portion of the Village of Launois, which offered shelter to the enemy's trenches. The attack was prepared by a bombardment with guns of heavy calibre which

"Desepite the intense fire of the enemy, our troops climbed out of the transhes at 6.30 o'clock in the evening, and half an hour later had attained the objectives assigned to them, penetrating even to the interior of the Village of Launois. One German blockhouse alone held out until the following morning, when it was surrounded by our troops.
"The Germans directed a counter-

attack, but they were easily repulsed. Our daily progress has since given us possession of a new group of houses, so that now we hold approximately half the village. "As a result of this action we took 11 officers and 825 men prisoners and also captured eight quick-firers, some comb throwers and a large number of
