

## MAYOR SCORES FLEMING IN INAUGURAL ADDRESS

What "R. J." Said When Mayor, a Present Embarrassment—Cloud of Motions.

With the receipt of 110 notices of motion aiming toward the general improvement of the city, the appointment of committees and the reference of the motions to the latter, the mayor's inaugural speech, and the usual luncheon of the council of 1911 got organized and down to business yesterday.

His Worship Mayor Geary summed up the civic situation, past and present, in about 5000 words, buried amongst which was a beautiful little jab at Bob Fleming's attempted justification of the P.A.Y.E. system. Digging back into civic records of 1886, when R. J. was mayor, he quoted from the inaugural address: "Every citizen is entitled to his seat when he pays his fare."

"We have now every reason to hope," said he, "that the ridiculous spectacle of the operation of a P.A.Y.E. system without P.A.Y.E. cars will not be again attempted in Toronto. The incident, however, illustrates the absolute disregard which the company have for the convenience and rights of the public and the desperate situation that the traveling public is in. Indeed, would it were not for the admirable legislation of the province.

"That there has been an insufficiency of cars almost from the date of the agreement is a fact which is well known to every citizen conversant with Toronto's street railway situation."

Touching the hydro-electric question he said:

"It will become the duty of the council to decide at the earliest possible moment whether or not we are to acquire the plant of the Toronto Electric Light Co. If the officers of the company are prepared to deal reasonably with the city, I personally, am prepared to support any and every arrangement having that object in view. If, on the contrary, the company is not disposed to meet us, no adequate means of municipal ownership need have the slightest fear that the great undertaking in which the city and the province have embarked will not result in the greatest good to all concerned. The great hydro-electric undertaking belongs to the municipalities who have entered into the power union, and must always continue to be their property."

Referring to St. Clair-avenue widening his worship said:

"It is necessary that we should decide at once upon the manner in which this street is to be laid out, inasmuch as it will be necessary to place railway tracks thereon in the near future. My own opinion is that the street railway tracks should be placed in the centre of the street. This would leave an excellent roadway on either side of the car tracks, and would also provide for adequate boulevards."

**Government and Harbor.**

In the event of the city's application for legislation reorganizing the harbor board being granted, the mayor hoped that the Dominion Government could be prevailed upon to expend the money necessary to properly develop the harbor and to deepen it to at least 25 feet, in order to meet the requirements of the vessels which are to use the improved Welland Canal.

**Railway Plans Soon.**

"During the past few months," he went on in reference to the railway situation, "I have been in correspondence with the chief officials of the Canadian Pacific Railway Co. in Montreal, as a result of which I have been promised that in the very near future the company's proposed plans for the extension of the line to the city will be laid before me. These are now in course of preparation and are to be, I understand, quite as comprehensive in character and extent as will amply provide for our present and future needs for many years to come."

**Civic Abattoir.**

Touching the inspection of meat, he opined that the ideal method would be to have a central municipally owned abattoir, with space reservations for wholesale butchers. It would mean proper inspection; the killing and storing of meat under proper sanitary conditions; the abolition of 23 private slaughter houses, which were nuisances, and the doing away with the dangerous practice of driving cattle thru the streets. Whether this would be realized the future only could decide.

Further he said that Toronto was behind the western cities in the matter of boulevards and pleasure drives, and he trusted a commencement might be made this year on a very extensive basis. Also, there should be no cessation in the work of improving the town-ship and county roadways leading to Toronto, until all the main approaches
