CHICAGO, June 15.—(Can. Press.)—Col. Roosevelt, wearing his new fighting hat, a compromise between the sombrero and a rough rider's headgear, came into Chicago late to-day and was acclaimed by thousands of his supporters and admirers. The hat was in the air thruout the automobile ride from La Salle-street station to the Congress Hotel, waving salutes of acknowledgement of the cheers that marked the former president's passing.

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Mr. Roosevelt declared to-night that he had not mapped out a plan of campaign. He was in consultation for several hours with the managers of his candidacy, and then assumed charge in person of "this naked flight between corrupt politicians and thieves and the plain people." He would not discuss his probable appearance on the floor of the convention, but there was no doubt among the delegates to-night but that he would be there. Col. Harry New, in charge of convention arrangements, said Mr. Roosevelt had not applied for a seat.

"If he does apply we will do the best we can for him," said Col. New, "but unfortunately all of the good seats are gone."
