Carefulness of the Foreign Mother for Daughter's Honor.

The spirit of helpfulness which guides the affairs of Central Neighborhood House is, perhaps, never so apparent as in the efforts put forth to direct and assist the foreign mothers to reach an understanding of the ideals of Canadian womanhood.

Toronto women who visit this centre must always be deeply impressed with the practical ideas that are being worked out in this connection. Miss Helen Austin, the head worker, has spent five years, in this district; and during these years she has gathered many experiences which are proving of immense value to the work there. Miss Austin has some very level-headed, capable ideas about settlement work and she understands the problems of the women of her district as no other woman can. The majority of the mothers around Central Neighborhood House are Italians. Miss Austin has clubs for mothers meeting there every day. The Jewish women, the Chinese women and the Italian women, each have their regular club days.

Chinese Women.

Miss Austin spoke highly of the Chinese Women's Club which meets Wednesdays. These women are anxious to learn to kniit and to speak English. All are very well to do so can afford to buy wool and are learning to knit sweaters and overstockings for the children. They are all beautiful needle workers, so knitting is the one thing which Canadian women can teach them. Chinese women will not go out only in good weather; they are very careful mothers. BANKING BUSINESS **DEMANDS EFFICIENCY**

It is Not Pull That Gets the Bank Girl the Coveted Position.

An unexpected opportunity for advancement has come to the women in banks by the drafting of so many of the men. The banks are losing many men, trained, and in many cases impossible to replace. The only thing that can be done in many vacancies is to put in the best clerk available, and if that clerk happens to be a woman, there will be no obstacle placed in the path of promo-

the bank, and have done my best," said one girl. "The first three years I strove for efficiency with the prospect of advancement always before me. But I have found that 'pull,' not ability, is what gets the promotion." "Girls are advanced recause they are worth it," said a bank official-'Pull does not count any more in a bank than elsewhere. If a girl is not capable of handling a position, no man would suggest her for it, for any reason. Each clerk is watched by the man over her, and reported on at intervals, so when a girl deserves promotion she gets it—when a va-cancy occurs."

"I' have found the women in the banks so discourteous," said a bank depositor. "They are usually too busy talking to some of the male clerks when I go in to wait on me for several minutes, and then they do it as if it were a great favor." "We do not find our women dis-courteous," said an accountant. "We are careful to choose women who will not be that type." All the banks confess to being in a dilemma regarding the vacancies that will shortly be in their staffs.
