Toronto and Outside Clubs Continue to Reorganize—Some Notes.

New York, Nov. 23.—With all the Amateur Hockey League games for the season scheduled to be played in the St. Nicholas rink, the enthusiasts are looking forward to a season of more than average interest. In fact, reservations have already been placed by the fans for the seats for the entire series. The schedule does not start until after the holidays, the opening game, on Tuesday, Jan. 8, 1907, at 8 o'clock, three weeks later than last season. Likewise the season closes nearly two weeks earlier, giving six weeks' rest for the season. The league is made up of the four teams that finished last season—the Crescent Athletic Club, the New York Athletic Club, the St. Nicholas Hockey Club and the Hockey Club of New York. Each team will play each of the other teams two games, making 12 games in all. It would not be fair to charge offhand that Mr. Jones has propagated this feeling, but that his friends in the city council have been bestirring themselves in his behalf is an assured fact.

"All lies," was his vigorous declaration to the report that he was a promoter of the movement. He said he understood that Ald. Stewart was the chief architect of the plan. "That's the first I've heard of it," commented Dr. Sheard, when spoken to about the rumors. "I have nothing to say about it for the present."
