Dr. H. C. Rutter, manager of the Hospital for Epleptics, Gallipolis, Ohio, then took the cnair, and distroduced Daniel Clark, M.D., medical superintendent, Asylum for the Insane, Theorem.

Dr. Clark read an excellent paper on "The Relation of the Public to the Insane," in which he accentuated most strongly the incontrovertible and awful effects of heredity.

"At least 60 per cent. of the insane are foredomed by heredity," he said, "and much of this tendency could be avoided were there some way to prevent unsuitable marriages. Law would be considered oppressive were it to interfere, and the cry of private and personal rights infringed upon would make any statute inoperative.

Therease of Taxation.

Dr. Clark declared prophetically that the time would come, however, "when the increase of taxation for criminal and charitable purposes shall reach such a stage of magnitude as to be very burdensome, because of the necessity to support in institutions or otherwise the mighty army of diseased and defective citizens who have been begotten it some enfeeblement, and in after yars thrown on the charity of the robust public by thousands and tens of thousands. "In time radical and surgical measures must be adopted by the State," believes Dr. Clark, "to stem this influx of degeneracy for which it pays so dearly and so many suffer. In the meantime the various State and Provincial authorities would do much good by instructing health boards to issue a chapter or two among their literature upon the bad effects of unsuitable marriages, especially with relation to the children of such unions."
