High School Trustees Again Discuss Amalgamation Question.

A letter was received from City Clerk Mevins and given out to the members of the High School Board, dated June 14, notifying the board that a special committee had been appointed to confer with committees of the Public and High School Boards to discuss the question of amalgamating the boards.

Mr. Ross moved, seconded by Mr. Williams, that this committee be composed of the chairman of the Boarding and Standing Committees, Messrs. Ross, Hastings, Dr. Ryan and Mrs. Hastings.

Mr. McRae moved, in amendment, that the letter should be merely answered.

Mr. B. F. Clarke, M.P., said: "I am opposed to amalgamation, but if I thought it was opposing a good reform, I would withdraw my opposition."

In order to be in order one gentleman after who wished to speak, having spoken, had to be seconded the amendment. This was done by Mr. Williams.

Five or six members talked and then Mr. Clarke told Mr. Davies that he was trying to get a decision from the board, trying to get the board's pulse, whereas the committee should have the voice.

Mr. L. V. McRae, in a clear, forcible manner, told those assembled what should be done, and, incidentally, brought out a motion for the existence of the City Council, which was elected to elect High School trustees." This was the outcome of several expressions of opinion.

The regular reports of the board were passed.

REBELLION IN URUGUAY.

Military at Monte Video Revolted Against the Government But

Were Soon Put Down.

Washington, D.C., July 5.—The State Department has posted the following bulletin:

An official telegram was received yesterday by the Department of State from Montevideo, announcing a military revolt against the government of Uruguay in the Capital, in which many were killed and wounded. Martial law has been declared, and citizens are being called in defence of the Government, which is said to be holding its own, although a renewed attack by the revolutionists is momentarily expected.

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JUBILAN IN LONDON.

American Colony's Fourth of July

Banquet Was a Love Feast.

Many Prominent Englishmen Joined in the Festivity—Santiago Described as a Brilliant Victory—

"We Bow the Heart, If Not the Knee" to Queen Victoria.

London, July 5.—The annual dinner of the American Society in London yesterday being a jubilation over the victory of Santiago. Five hundred Americans gathered, and the British and United States flags hung over the table.

There was an unusual number of prominent English visitors. Among them were many Liberals, some whom attended the dinner to give notice to the report that the Liberals are older than the Conservatives toward an Anglo-American understanding. All classes of United States life were represented.

Among those present were Ambassador Bay, the Marquis of Dufferin and Ava; Mr. Calvin Bryce and Mr. James Bryce, Radical members of Parliament; Mr. E. L. Godkin, of The New York Post; Richard Croker, the Earl of Kimberley, Baron Kinnaird, Lord Brassey, the Lord Bishop of Rochester, and the Lord Bishop of Exeter. Mr. Sir Donald Martin Stewart, Sir Edward J. Foy, president of the Royal Academy; Sir H. H. Russell, M.P.

The chairman toasted "Her Majesty the Queen" in a speech, the honor of which was Whittier's line: "We bow the heart if not the knee," a sentiment which was warmly applauded.

The Marquis of Ripon voiced the earnest hope that the signs of friendship between the kindred nations would not be an aberration of temporary sentiment, but would preface a closer and permanent union, referring to the battle of Santiago, he said: "It is a gallant victory over our common enemy of steel." [Cheers.]
